

the McLorinans of Killcross.* David McLorinan died without issue in 1767, his will being dated in that year, and proved September 22. After making provision for his cousin, Mary O'Neill, he bequeathed the rest of his property to the children of his sister-in-law, Mary McLorinan, viz: Paul; James, *of whom hereafter*; Mary, and Catharine McLorinan, all of whom were under age.†

V. JAMES McLORINAN, of Brockish, County Antrim, gent., (nephew of David of Ballyluman, and grandson of David of Cranfield,) succeeded to all the Ballyluman property in 1783, on the death, without issue, of his elder brother Paul, who was shot dead at his own hall-door by the Steelmen. The estate was situate in the Parish of Ahoghele, Barony of Upper Toome and County of Antrim, and consisted of about 350 acres, Irish plantation measure, subject to the chief rent of 2s. 6d. sterling, payable to the King forever, or a pair of gloves if required, and paid an annual rental of about £600; but it did not remain long in Mr. McLorinan's possession, as in 1793 he sold it to his brother-in-law, Mark Devlin.

James McLorinan married ———, sister of Mark Devlin, Esquire, of Newry, County Down.‡

VI. PAUL McLORINAN, of Woodbury, Gloucester County, New Jersey, gent., (eldest son of James,) immigrated to the United States and settled at Woodbury, where he died some time prior to July 11, 1804, when letters of administration on his estate were granted to Josiah Elbridge, Esquire.||

Paul McLorinan married, at Christ Church, Philadelphia, January 11, 1801, Margaret, daughter of Thomas and Mary Hill, of that city, and widow of Captain ——— Forrester, by whom she had one son, John Forrester, who settled in New
