

was translated and published in Welch and in French. Lewis Bayly died in 1632, and was buried in the church of Bangor.

The following anecdote is related in a paper by Mr. Davies of Lanark. "Mr. Secretary Hanton did, by his Majesty's orders, call Bishop Bayly into the Council chamber, and there gave him a severe reprimand, because in his prayer before the sermon, the Sunday before in Lincoln's Inn, he had prayed for the King's son-in-law, and his daughter the Lady Elizabeth, under the titles of King and Queen of Bohemia, contrary to the express orders or directions of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London, and before his Majesty had owned their titles, &c. He aggravates the matter much, and in conclusion tells him his Majesty was deservedly offended with him, and so leaves him under his high displeasure."

He left four sons, — Nicholas, John, Theodore, and Thomas. His youngest son, Thomas, had the degree of D. D. at Oxford. In 1646 he was with the Marquis of Worcester in Ragland Castle, after the surrender of which, he retired into France. On his return to England, he published a book entitled *Certamen Religiosum*, or a Conference between King Charles I. and Henry late Marquis of Worcester, concerning Religion, in Ragland Castle anno 1646, printed in 1649. This was thought too much to favor the Church of Rome,
