

William Ketelhuyn, besides being a zealous and influential member of the Reformed Dutch Church at Schaghticoke, was for several years one of its officers. As a deacon, he served from December 19, 1777, to December 9, 1779; and as elder, from December 2, 1798, to December 2, 1800. Upon the death of his wife, on April 1, 1816, he changed his home to that of his daughter,

In his will, made in the town of Schaghticoke, on September 17, 1817, the two ways of spelling the family-name, then in vogue, are strikingly exemplified: "First I give unto the heirs of my oldest son Douw Kittle, deceased, the sum of two hundred and sixty-two dollars, which is to come out of a mortgage given by William and John Myers, which money was let to Simon Kettle at the time of the first division of moneys
