Memoranda. Alice Ann Cooper, through her mother, Elizabeth Colden Cooper, descended from Cadwallader Colden, lieutenant-governor of the province of New York, under his majesty, George III. He, (her great grandfather,) and his son David, surveyor-general of the province of New York, (her grandfather,) adhered to the royal cause and as a consequence their estates were confiscated. David Colden was banished and died in England in 1784. A conveyance, executed on March 31, 1815, shows that "Samuel Swartwout of the city of New York, merchant and Alice Ann, his wife," were purchasers of the property described in it. The funeral of the Hon. Samuel Swartwout, on Sunday, November 23, 1856, is thus described by a New York city newspaper.

"Trinity Church was nearly filled yesterday at one o'clock P.M., by the personal friends of the late Samuel Swartwout, and by those who, personally unacquainted with him, yet respected his memory. The corpse had been conveyed during the morning into the vestry-room of the church, where the features of the deceased were beheld for the last time by those who had been familiar with the living man for years. Mr. Swartwout was in his seventy-fourth year when he died, and a very large number of those who yesterday paid him the last melancholy tribute of affection and respect were old men, themselves tottering to the tomb. The burial service of the Episcopal Church was read from the altar by Rev. Dr. Hobart, one of the incumbents of Trinity Church, assisted by Rev. Mr. Eaton of St. Clement's Church. The coffin was mahogany, lined with white satin, and bore, on a silver-plate, the following inscription :
