

southward and eastward of Fort Jackson, while his mortar vessels poured a terrific fire of shells into it." The following noteworthy comment conclusively shows that Farragut's undertaking to reach and capture New Orleans was a most perilous one: "Thus was accomplished a feat in naval warfare which had no precedent, and which is still without a parallel except the one furnished by Farragut himself, two years later, at Mobile. Starting with seventeen wooden vessels, he had passed with all but three of them, against the swift current of a river but half a mile wide, between two powerful earthworks, which had long been prepared for him, his course impeded by blazing rafts, and immediately thereafter had met the enemy's fleet of fifteen vessels, two of them ironclad, and either captured or destroyed every one of them. Memoranda. John Swartwout Barkalow married in Paterson, N. J., November 11, 1862, Esther E. Dickey. He was admitted to the bar in New Jersey in November, 1857; was city attorney at Paterson, N. J., in 1864-65, 1865-66, and 1867-68; county judge of Passaic County, N. J., from 1871 to 1881; judge of the Court of Errors and Appeals of New Jersey, from March, 1896 to April, 1897; he began a third term of five years as county judge of Passaic County, on April 1, 1897.
