Memoranda. Frederick Philip died in Tarrytown, June 12, 1876. At one time Thomas George Swartwout, attorney-at-law, occupied an office in Cortlandt Street, corner of Church Street, New York city; in 1880, at 181 Broadway, and in 1881-82, at 176 Broadway. He lived in Valhalla, Westchester County, in 1878 and 1879, and moved to Staten Island in the spring of 1880. He won no little fame for the able way in which he prosecuted the charge against Reinhardt for the murder of his wife in Stapleton, Staten Island, whose body he placed in a barrel and buried it at Silver Lake, near Stapleton. Attorney Swartwout represented in the case the district-attorney of Richmond County, and by his legal acumen and oratorical presentation of the evidence secured the conviction of Reinhardt, who was hanged at the jail of Richmond County. The case was fought through all the courts, and every decision was in favor of the prosecuting attorney, notwithstanding he was opposed by the famous criminal defender, William F. Howe.

- DCLXXXII. Henry Alden, son of Henry and Mary Matilda Alden Swartwout, born in Fort Jesup, Louisiana, on December 16, 1834, and died, unmarried, in Galveston, Texas, on October 8, 1867.
