THE OLDEST AND BEST.

It advocates a reform in the monetary laws. It advocates a reduction in the rates of interest. It advocates the repeal of the present national banking system. It advocates a change in paper currency. It protests against the payment of the five-twenty bonds in gold and the increase of the gold-bearing securities of the Government. It advocates the equalization of taxation among all classes. It advocates a reform in the tariff laws. It advocates the eight-hour system of labor. It advocates the prevention of Chinese immigration and the protection of the labor interest by legislative enactment. It advocates the assessment from the wealth of the country all money necessary for prosecuting wars. It advocates the holding of the public lands for the benefit of the people, and the granting of it free of cost in amounts not exceeding 160 acres to landless settlers, and protests against disposing of it to corporations or individuals. It claims that the treaty-making power of Congress has no authority to dispose of public lands without the joint sanction of both Houses of Congress.
