

titles, existing either by selection or in consequence of the consolidation of two or more separate publications. Such are the *Comet and Advertiser*, *Review and Herald*, *Citizen and Banner*, *Mirror-Journal*, *Globe-Democrat*, and others. There is even a *Times, Post and Observer*. Notwithstanding the amplitude of the titles already furnished, they yet do not cover a large number of publications known by special or by invented titles. They abound in the large cities, and as they are not capable of distillation, their presentation in a tabular form is not feasible. They embrace a majority of the monthlies and other periodicals, some of them being odd and short, while others seem to vie in ponderosity. The *Christian Union Witness or the Olive Branch of Peace*, *Advent Review and Sabbath Herald*, *Domestic Monthly*, *Church Magazine*, *In Door and Out*, *Industrial and Harkness' Magazine*, as well as the *Church Paper*, *Christian at Work*, and *Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper*, are specimens of the different styles of this class of titles. Among the unusual or striking titles are the *Bistoury* (Elmira, N. Y.), *Jimplecute* (Jefferson, Tex.), *Lucapiltan* (Fayette C. H. Ala.), the *Card Basket*—a society paper—of Washington, the *Hope Star of Hope* (Ark.), *Thistleton's Illustrated Jolly Giant* (San Francisco), *China Mail and Flying Dragon*, the *Elm Leaf* (East Hartford, Conn.), the *Eulenspiegel* (Owl's Mirror) of Chicago, *Jefferson Republican*, the *Southern Cross*—a Catholic paper—of Savannah, the *Egyptian Press* (Marion, Ill.), *Hoosier Patron and Lady Granger* (Indianapolis), *Hoosier State*, *Union Spy*—there is only one—*Condenser*, *Meschacebe*, *Wide Awake*—a literary paper—*Iron Home* (Ishpeming, Mich.), *Morgan's Watch-tower* (Mt. Pleasant, Mich.), the *Ricochet* (Oxford, Miss.), *Blätter und Kladderadatsch*, the *Schneidderdeng*, *Freedman's Monitor* and *Workingman's Looking Glass* (Phila.), the *I. C. B. U. Journal* (also in Phila.), the *Four Counties* of Richmond, Texas, the *Ventilator and Golden Rule* (Mannington, W. Va.), *Eurhetorian Argosy* (Sackville, Ont.), *Stylus*, *Lady Elyin* (Elgin, Ill.), *Over the Country*, *Pajaronian*, *Aurora Brazileira*, *Neighbor's Home Mail*, *Psyche*, *Madisonensis*, and the *Alpine Chronicle* of Silver Mountain, California. There is also a *Confederate* (Canada), and *Lively Times* (Prescott, Ont.). There are two *Socialists*, and only one *Triumph*. Names of papers published in foreign languages, except those previously given, may be placed in a miscellaneous group. The most unpronounceable are *Y Cyfaill o'r Hen Wlad*, *Y Cenhadwr Americanaidd*, *Y Dasg*, and others of the same language—the Welsh. There is also a *Debnicke Listy*, a *Pokrok*, and a *Pokrok Zapadu*. It is worth while to mention retrospectively that there is a *Genius of Liberty* among our own papers. The *Ladies' Bureau* of Marshalltown, Iowa, sounds very mysterious, but as that journal is a woman suffrage advocate, the *Bureau* probably contains nothing but a pair of pantaloons. Names popularly supposed to be frequent are in fact rare. It occasionally happens that the prominence attained by a single paper with a certain name brings the name so much before the people, that it grows familiar to the public mind, though there may really be but few papers with the same designation. What the journalistic fancy of the Centennial year will devise in the way of newspaper titles is uncertain; but altogether, the subject is
