APPENDIX.

[NOTE. This APPENDIX gives additions and corrections to the Genealogy. The same system of numbering as is there used is followed here, and the large head numbers and the numbers at the left refer to those used in the book and are identical with them. The numerals, from 1 to 10 enclosed in parentheses, indicate the number of the child or the marriage, in that particular family. When children are given, the family name is repeated only when it is some other than Gerould.]

DR. JACQUES JERAULD is said to have come to this country *via* England. In Medfield, Mass., he bought the "Joseph Adams homestead" in 1721. This was about one eighth of a mile from the Jerauld homestead, which, according to tradition, was built in 1765. Dr. Jerauld and wife were "received to occasional communion" in the Medfield church in 1750. He is said to have been seventy-three years old at the time of his death, which would make 1687 the year of his birth. Two sisters of his are said to have died in Medfield in 1748; and he is known to have taken an especial interest in a widow, Ann Lemoyne, who also may have been a sister. The "house that stands near the meeting-house," mentioned in the "will," was occupied and owned, after his death, by his daughters, Hannah and Susanna, by whom a portion of it was sold in 1765. The "will" was administered in 1760, and its witnesses were William Plympton, Eliazer Wheelock and Keziah Plympton. The will of his widow is in the Suffolk Probate.

The negro, Caesar, mentioned in the will, died in Wrentham, Mass., in 1789. Pompey Edes of Boston being his administrator. It is evident that he fell into the hands of Gamaliel Gerould.

The following document, in his hand writing, has come into the possession of the compiler. As will be seen, it is partly in French. The orthography of the document is followed.

"febrier, The 16 Day 1733

Rescived of Mestres hebram hardain [Abraham Harding] The sum of one pond and tean schelain [four illegible words follow] abegell masen [Abigail Mason, a ward of Abraham Harding,] I said Rescived By me, James Jerauld, Dr."
