

Joseph Cox of West Yoke, parish of Ash-next-Ridley, co. Kent, born and bapt. at Farningham 13 Sep. 1788; he joined in the sale in 1816 of the Stokehaw and Rendlys Hoath estates at Chiddingstone to his brother John Cox, and of Middletons to his brother Solomon Penury Cox; living at Heston, and Cranford, co. Middlesex, and died 1856, unmarried. Mentions the daughters of John King of Wateringbury, co. Kent, in his will.

John Cox of the "Black Eagle" Brewery, co. Surrey, born at Farningham 23 Feb. 1790; bapt. 19 March; seised in fee of the entirety of the said Stokehaw and Rendlys Hoath estates, as possessed by his ancestor Joseph Cox in 1675 and 1699, by purchase of his brother's shares in 1816; at the same time he disposed of his share in the lands at Longfields to his brother Solomon Penury Cox; died unmarried 1873.

Mary Cox, born at Farningham 22 March 1793; bur. there 23 Aug. 1797. M.I.

Solomon Penury Cox of the Inner Temple, London, born at Farningham 8 April and bapt. there 29 April 1794; he disposed of his share of Stokehaw and Rendlys Hoath estates to his brother John Cox in 1816, and in 1822 was in sole possession of Middletons at Longfield (as possessed by his ancestors above named), by purchase of his brothers' shares in 1816; died unmarried at Limpsfield, co. Surrey, at the house of his brother Henry, 20 Jan., and bur. there 30 Jan. 1850. Will dated 26 April 1842; proved in Prerogative Court of Canterbury 25 March 1850. He bequeathed a silver salver, with armorial engraving and inscription, "to his kinsman Mr. John King of Wateringbury," also his portrait from a drawing by Richard Dighton of Cheltenham, printed by G. Rowe, Cheltenham, with autograph signature, "S. P. Cox," 1840, which salver the aforesaid John King devised to his daughter Elizabeth Eleanor King in 1861, and which was bequeathed by the latter in 1898 to her nephew Stephen Henham King in trust to his eldest son and heir.
