Location:

Clifton Townsite, 175 Frisco Street, Clifton, Greenlee County, Arizona

Significance:

This house is typical of rental houses constructed in Clifton between about 1900 and 1920.

Description:

The Archie Morrison Rental House is of the National Folk - Hall and Parlor style. It is a one-story wood frame building with wood clapboard siding. The hip roof is covered in corrugated metal roofing and features two gablet dormer/ventilators. There is a front entry porch with a shed roof and a wood railing. Many additions have been made to the rear of the building. Few original windows remain, most having been replaced with sliding aluminum units. Original windows are six-light wood casements surrounded by 4" wide trim.

History:

This frame dwelling was a rental house constructed between 1900 and 1904 by Arizona Copper Company concentrator foreman Archie Morrison (for additional information on Morrison see AZ-170). The plat map of Morrison's Addition indicates that the property was retained by Morrison in 1900 and the 1908 Arizona Copper Co. base map notes it as Morrison's rental property.¹
