**Location:** Fitzsimons General Hospital, Motor Transport Dispatcher's Office  
(Fitzsimons General Hospital, Building No. 200)  
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**Significance:** This building is associated with the early development of the post, having been completed in 1919 by contractor C.S. Lambie. Elements representing the early building period at the post include the overhanging eaves with exposed rafters, the paneled and glazed door, six-light window, and the stucco composition of the walls.

**Description:** This one-story, concrete, west-facing, two-bay, small rectangular building rests on a concrete foundation. The building measures 489 square feet. The walls are stuccoed. The hipped roof with widely overhanging eaves and exposed rafters is covered with tiles. On the north facade is a small shed-roof porch under the eaves. The shed roof is supported with a single wood post and concrete base. Fenestration consists of six-light windows with concrete surrounds. There are two paneled and glazed doors, one located on the west elevation and the other on the north elevation.

**History:** This building was constructed in 1919 and was identified as Building 785. It has been utilized as both a dispatcher's office and a bank for the installation.

There have been minor alterations to this structure since its construction. The frame stoop on the west entrance has been removed. A small addition was made to the northeast side of the north elevation. Currently the building is used as the motor transport dispatcher's office.
