Location:

The Hogan House is located on the east side of U.S. 27/State Route 1 approximately 0.04 mile south of Ringer Road in Carroll County, Georgia. The resource is oriented to the west facing U.S. 27/State Route 1.

Significance:

The Hogan House is a c. 1912 Central Hallway house type of frame construction. It is significant for its architecture as a representative example of a Central Hallway house type. The resource is virtually intact on the exterior, retaining its original materials and design.

Description:

The Hogan House is a one-story c. 1912 Central Hallway with front and back porch additions and two rear ell additions. The house is of frame construction and is clad with clapboard siding. The foundation is comprised of stone piers. The original portion of the house possesses a gable roof. One of the additions also possesses a gable roof, while the other addition has a shed roof. Both porches have shed roofs. While the house at one time appears to have contained two chimneys, only one chimney located on the rear elevation of the original portion of the house remains. Evidence of a side end chimney is noted on the south elevation. Windows are one-over-one double hung sash, and appear to be original. The panel and glass door in the front entrance also appears to be original.

Access to the interior was not available, however, a view through the glass portion of the front door revealed that the floor plan in the Central Hallway appears intact.

History:

The land on which the Hogan House is sited was purchased by Mr. J.H. Hogan in 1912 from Mr. N.B. Baughman. The land was described as being located in the northeast corner of Land Lot 29, and specified that the lot contained fifteen acres and a house. Mr. Hogan subsequently purchased additional acreage in a contiguous land lot, for a combined total of approximately 72 acres. Although the house is now abandoned, it remains the property of the Hogan Family. Mr. J.H. Hogan's widow is the present owner of the house.
