(Naval Magazine Lualualei, West Loch Branch, Building Nos. 6 and 7)

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**Location:** Northeast of the intersection of 4th Street and D Avenue, NAVMAG West Loch, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

**Significance:** These buildings serve as excellent intact examples of military construction in the 1930s, and are significant as part of the initial base construction.

**Description:** Similar to buildings #240 and #241, these structures are situated parallel to and facing each other. They are constructed of concrete foundation and ground floor slab, and steel second and third level floor framing, wall structure, and roof framing. The floor plan is a T-shape, and the center section has a higher clerestory roof. There is a roll-up steel door on each side of the front protruding section, which the train used to run through and stop for loading. Other doors are steel with four lights at each door, and windows are steel frame pivoted windows. The roofing and exterior wall finish is corrugated asbestos.

The interior has a steel stair leading to all three floors located at the outer side of the central section (north at Building 6 and south at Building 7). The central portion is open to the roof, with a trolley at the ceiling leading from one side of the building to the other. The upper two floors are wood boards supported on steel beams. Metal railings line the perimeter of the upper two floors around the open central area. See HABS No. HI-265 for additional description of the base.

**History:** The buildings were constructed in 1932. The buildings appear to be unaltered, other than the removal of the train tracks. See HABS No. HI-265 for additional history of the base.
