Significance:

The U.S. Naval Base, Pearl Harbor was designated as a National Historic Landmark in 1964; due to the crucial role it played in the Nation's defense during the twentieth century and the calamitous events which occurred on December 7, 1941. As a Category 3 structure, it is determined that Building No. 666 functioned as a part of the Pearl Harbor Naval Base, but is only of minor importance to the historic character of the National Landmark.

Description:

Building No. 666 is a 1,782 SF, permanent, concrete, one story building with basement. The first floor is a covered three car garage, constructed of CMU with concrete plaster exterior finish and a corrugated metal roof. The basement constructed with 10" - 12" thick concrete walls is an administrative storage area (34' x 32-1/2' x 13' high). The basement is accessed by an exterior concrete stairway.

History:

Building 666, an Emergency Vehicle Garage, was reconstructed from an existing concrete septic tank in 1937 at a cost of \$27,605. A covered three car garage was constructed on top of the existing septic tank, and the septic tank was later converted into a Venereal Treatment Room and storage area. The first floor of this facility, the three car garage, housed the ambulance for the adjacent Dispensary (Building 665). The septic tank was probably part of the construction of the adjacent 1,200 men barracks (Building 654)

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in 1927.

In 1964, the basement of Building 666 was renovated into medical training classrooms and an air conditioning system was installed.

In 1965, the first floor Building 666 was renovated to increase the height of the garage from 8' 6" to 10' 10".




