Location: County Road #15007, west of County Road #360, East Nottingham Township, Chester County, Pennsylvania. (Reference: Map of Chester County /by County Commissioners/ 1956).

Present Owner: Arthur D. Cleaver, Oxford R. D. #2, Pennsylvania.

Brief Statement Of Significance: This stone inn, probably erected between 1715 and 1720, was completed to its present size by 1745. Important features include a very rare main door, fine hardware and paneling throughout the house, and a swinging partition between two second floor rooms.

1. Thomas Hughes got license in 1731 and continued until his death in 1745.
2. Elizabeth Hughes continued 1746-1749, she was widow of Thomas Hughes.
3. Elisha Hughes 1750-1770; son of Thomas and Elizabeth Hughes.
4. Samuel Morton had it 1771.

5. Joseph Lacey had it 1772-1773; in 1772 the tavern petition mentions a name for the first time - the "Cross Keys".
 6. George Liggett had the Cross Keys in 1774.
 7. Sarah Baldwin had it 1775.
 8. Timothy Kirk had it 1776. No record for 1777.
 9. Abraham Ritchie had it 1778. No records for 1779-1781.
 10. Timothy Kirk, Jr. had it, calling it the "Three Tuns" 1782-1783.
 11. Wm. Barrett had it in 1784; 1786 (when he called it Kirk's Tavern); 1787 (when he called it "Two Tuns",); 1788 when he called it "Three Tuns".
 12. Samuel Johnson had it in 1789 calling it the "Three Tuns"; and in 1790 he called it Kirk's tavern.
 13. Hugh Ramsay had it in 1791, 1792 (Three Tuns), 1793 (Stone Tavern, 1794-1796, 1797 (Stone Tavern, 1798 (Stone Tavern), 1799-1824 usually calling it the Stone Tavern.

- During the latter years many petitions against granting a license were filed with the Court.
2. Date of Erection: First quarter of the 18th century - probably about 1715 - 1720.
 3. Architect, builder, suppliers etc.: Unknown.
 4. Original plans, construction etc.: None known. Original house, the center section, was one large south room and two north rooms on first floor. On second floor - two north rooms and a large south room with a hinged board partition.
 5. Notes on alterations and additions: A story-and-a-half wing was added to the west, containing a kitchen in the west end and two small rooms in the west section. To the east, a

two-and-a-half story section was added, with two rooms on the first floor and three and a hall on the second floor. Center section and east wing had pent eave on south front and north side. Original house also had pent eave on west side. Cornice had returned on the west side of the original house also. Fireplace in the west wing has been walled up and the room has been made into two rooms - one north room and one south room.

B. Historical Events Connected with the Structure: Stone tavern had been completed to its present size by 1745 when the tavern keeper, Thomas Hughes, died and a very complete inventory was taken of his goods. He also had a brick store, the inventory of which is very interesting.

(1731) Your Petitioner humbly ahueeth Whereas John Littler Having had a Lisens from this Coart to keep Publick house he now is going away and your Petitioner Living upon ye same Road Joyning to ye sd Littler having a mind to Keep Publick house for ye Entertainment of travellors or all Shuch as Stands in Need your Petitioner humbly Desires yt this Onourabel Coart Would Greant Me A Lisenes for ye Same Which I hope Shall be Preformed wth as Good Rule and Order as ye Law derects in in Shuch a Case And your humbel petitioner will be very much oblidge to this Onorable Coart

The humbel Peticion of Thomas Hughes.

"Whereas we ye Inheabentance of Nottingham knowing ye Greate Nessesity of ye want of a Publick house by Shuch Crods of Travellers Going this way wch not Onely doth a Press Thoae on ye Publick Rhoads but also Private Neighbours

Grant ye A Bove Peticion as witness our hands this Twenty

3. Material from 1761:

"To all Christian People to whom these presents shall come George Slater of East Nottingham in the County of Chester, province of Pennsylvania yeoman sends greeting. Whereas in pursuance of a warrant from the commissioners of Property for William Penn Esq. propriator of the said Province there was formerly surveyed and laid out for William Beals a certain tract containing about three hundred Acres of Land lying in the sd Township of East Nottingham, which he the said William Beals settled upon and possessed and afterwards for the consideration of the sum of thirty five Pounds did Bargain Sell & convey the greatest part of it unto a certain Samuel Whiting as appears by his Deed poll for the same bearing date the 24th day of the eleventh month Anno 1724/5 And the said Samuel Whiting being seized & peaceably possess'd of the said tract of land did afterwards for the consideration of forty two Pounds current money of America Bargain Sell and Convey the same Land unto the said George Slater by his Deed poll bearing date the 24th day of the third Month in the year 1728, who has lived upon and hold the same until this time, and now being willing in lifetime to have his son John Slater in full and free possession of a certain part of the said tract of Land as Conveyed as aforesaid. Know ye that the said George Slater for and in consideration of the natural laws and affection which he hath & doth bear unto & towards his said son John Slater of the Township & County aforesaid yeoman, as well as for ye sum of five shillings to him in hand paid by his said son & other good causes & considerations him thereunto moving, he hath given granted sold and conveyed and by those presents doth freely fully and absolutely give grant bargain sell. Convey unto his said son John Slater a certain part and parcel of the said tract of land with the Messuage & Tenement thereon situate at the west end of the said tract & being lately surveyed and laid off for his us, is bounded as follows vizt: Beginning at a Post the corner of Thomas Barrett's & William Churchman's Land, running thence by the latter North 87 degrees East 104 perches to a Stone at the Cross Roads near the said John's dwelling house & South Eastward of the same, thence North sixteen degrees and a half West (along the Limesian Road & near where it was originally laid out) 162 perches to a Post, thence by Land of Micajah James South 42½ degrees West 91 perches to a Post, thence by said Barret's land south one degree & 45 minutes easterly 93 perches & a half to the place of Beginning containing sixty five Acres and an half Acre & the allowance of six Acres P cont for Roads &c. together with all the Buildings & Improvements thereon standing & being & all ways, Easements, Profits, commodities, Advantages and Appurtenances whatsoever thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining".

PART II. ARCHITECTURAL INFORMATION

A. General Statement

1. Architectural Character: As early as 1745 there was added to the original house an east and a west wing. Relatively few changes have been made in the inn since that time.
2. Condition of Fabric: Fair to good.

B. Technical Description of Exterior

1. Overall dimensions: Two-and-a-half stories, plus one-and-a-half stories to west. Original (center) section 30'9" by 30'6"; east addition 18'6" by 30'6"; west wing 22'3" by 25'6".
2. Foundations: Stone.
3. Wall construction: Stone.
4. Chimneys: Brick.
5. Openings
 - a. Doorways and doors: All seem original.
 - b. Windows and shutters: All seem original; fine lot of very early shutters stored in basement that fit the windows.
6. Roof
 - a. Shape, covering: Steep pitch; modern asbestos shingles.
 - b. Cornice, eaves: Not original; first building's cornice continued around sides; had pent eaves front and back, and on west side, perhaps on east.
 - c. Dormers: None.

C. Technical Description of Interiors

1. Floor Plans: Original center section - large south room and two north rooms on first floor. Second floor was same, except a swinging partition in the south room.
West wing - originally a kitchen in the west end and two very small rooms, one north and one south, in the east end of this wing; it had board partitions.
West wing - first floor a north and a south room; on second floor three small rooms and a hall.
2. Stairways: Original.
3. Flooring: Old, except that a modern one has been put on the old one in the center section, south room.

4. Wall and ceiling finish: Mostly plaster.
5. Doorways and doors: All seem like fine original ones.
6. Trim: Mostly all original and intact.
7. Hardware: Fine - almost all intact.
8. Lighting: Modern electricity.
9. Heating: Kitchen fireplace has been boarded up; the rest remain.

D. Site

1. General setting and orientation: Building faces south, and is in North West sector of cross roads.
2. Enclosures: None.
3. Outbuildings: Modern.
4. Walks, driveways, etc.: None.
5. Landscaping, gardens etc.: Very, very little.
