SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL, INCLUDE ORIGINAL USE OF STRUCTURE) Constructed by noted politician and planter, Charles Cotesworth Pinckney (1789-1865), the house has been owned by several noted South Carolina families, including the Adgers and Smythes. Architecturally, it is an interesting example of "Up-country" architecture, designed to provide maximum ventilation in the warm climate.

MATERIAL OF CONSTRUCTION (INCLUDE STRUCTURAL SYSTEMS) frame, sheathed in clapboards		
SHAPE AND DIMENSIONS OF STRUCTURE (SKETCHED FLOOR PLANS ON SEPARATE PAGES ARE ACCEPTABLE) 2-1/2 stories, plus raised basement; 2-story piazza along south, east and west facades; 1-story porch on north facade; gable roof.		
EXTERIOR FEATURES OF NOTE Double French doors on 1st floor lead to piazza; some 2nd-story windows have hinged panels below to give access to piazza; main entrance has sidelights and transom; fluted exterior woodwork with Greek key design		
INTERIOR FEATURES OF NOTE (DESCRIBE FLOOR PLANS, IF NOT SKETCHED) Walls are finished with boards about 10" wide, most laid horizontally; double doors of parlor have fluted trim with corner blocks decorated by stars; original mantels and other woodwork		
MAJOR ALTERATIONS AND ADDITIONS WITH DATES House was enlarged ca. 1850; in the 20th century a "widow's walk" was removed from the top of the house; Woodburn was restored in the late 1960's.
