



- LOCATION: West Side of State Route 600, .8 mile North of State Route 778, Clover Vicinity, Halifax County, Virginia
- SIGNIFICANCE: Although less than 50 years of age, this building contributes to the significance of Edgewood Farm in that it is associated with an activity (tobacco growing and curing) historically associated with the farm.
- DESCRIPTION: This two-level frame storehouse measures 32' X 21' with a 16' X 11' lean-to attached to the south wall. The building is set on a concrete foundation which is situated on a slope, so that the west door is approximately 4' above grade while the east door is 1 and 1-1/2' above grade. The building is framed with dimensioned lumber, as seen by the studs and attic joists exposed on the interior. The exterior is sheathed with asphalt roll siding and the roof is covered with seamed metal. An exterior concrete block chimney is centered on the south half of the west wall. The lean-to is framed with pole posts and dimensioned lumber rafters, and is sheathed with horizontal planking and vertical planks in the area below the slope of the roof. The interior is divided east-west into two rooms. Stairs in the east room lead to the windowless second story. Doors are centered in the east and west ends, and double leaf doors in the south wall of the west room open onto a loading area in the lean-to. A double window, centered in the north wall of the west room, consists of 6-light sash hinged as casements.
- HISTORY: The construction date of this building is unknown, although it clearly post-dates the many log outbuildings on the farm. It appears to have served as a space to store cured tobacco leaves prior to their shipment to market.
