HISTORIC AMERICAN BUILDINGS SURVEY
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(World War II Temporary Buildings, Ward-Standard)
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Location: On the north side of South Tenth Avenue, in the northwest quadrant of the hospital area, Block 10 of the main cantonment at Fort McCoy, Sparta vicinity, Monroe County, Wisconsin.

Significance: Building T-1035 is a Standard Hospital Ward, Type W-1, with a 33-bed capacity; as one of thirty such buildings, it is the most common type of structure located at the hospital area.

Description: Single story, wood frame construction on concrete piers; cement asbestos shingle exterior siding, asphalt shingle roof at 5/12 pitch. Main axis runs northwest/southeast; three sets of double wood doors, each single unit with two recessed panels below and four lights above, one set each at the northwest, southeast and southwest sides; total of forty-six six-over-six double-hung wood windows. Overall dimension: 25'-4" x 150'-6" (12 bays of 9' & 7 bays of 6'), approximately 17' to roof ridge. Screened porch on southwest side, 9' x 59'-10"; solarium at southeast end, approximately 10' x 25'. Interior plan: at northwest end, single corridor with thirteen flanking rooms, including kitchen, office, lavatories, two wards with one bed in each; open ward for 31 beds occupies over 70% of the plan (a partition dividing the open ward, which has double wood doors, each unit with five recessed panels, was constructed in 1985). Vinyl tile installed in 1952 over wood flooring; concrete at kitchen, lavatories and utility room; pressed board walls and ceiling; knee braces in open ward; horizontal tongue-and-groove wainscot throughout, except the kitchen, which has ceramic tile installed in 1952.

History: Erected on September 26, 1942 during the initial construction phase at Camp McCoy (as Fort McCoy was then known) during the mobilization build-up for World War II. Constructed by the firm of J.P. Cullen and Son of Janesville, Wisconsin. Based on Plan Number 700-462, Type W-1, Ward-Standard, from the 700 Series of standard construction drawings. Cost of construction was \$22,132.00.
