Letter from Mrs. Alexander Graham Bell to Dr. Alexander Graham Bell. 26 W. 47th St., New York City. Wednesday, March 25, 1903. My dear Alec:

Thank you so very much for your letter. I really did not expect it and it was such a nice one, it was worth waiting for. Nobody can write such nice letters as you when you want to.

I hope you will get this before you leave. I was so disappointed my yesterday's letter did not go until this morning, but there was no one to take it out and they don't seem to have letter boxes here as they do at home, at least I haven't seen any.

We shall be so glad to see you tomorrow and I'll go with you anywhere and do anything you say. But I really would like Dr. Kennicutt to see you, if only to tell me that you are all right. Daisy is so pleased because Dr. Cleveland has just been and told her of a lot of things that were wrong with her and which he thinks he has put straight, or in a way to grow straight. I am equally glad for I am sure that now that enough things have been discovered to account for her illness and we may hope to remedy them. At least it is not fighting in the dark.

I shall be ready to return with you tomorrow night if necessary. I purpose to come back for Daisy next week, she will be able to leave the middle of next week the doctor says.
