

Letter from Alexander Graham Bell to Mabel Hubbard Bell, April 21, 1917, with transcript

ALEXANDER GRAHAM BELL TO MABEL (Hubbard) BELL Beinn Bhreagh, C. B.
Saturday, April 21, 1917. At the "Get-away." My darling little wife:

Just a word to say I am alive and well. I am engaged just now in studying my old note-books to see results of old towing experiments. Lots of notes during 1914 and 1915. We have open water here now but no motor boats yet available. Best thing I can do is to study up past experiments.

Am now cataloging them in my new note-book. Am trying to send you a note every day — written or dictated — so that you may know I am thinking of you.

Weather here just suits me — cold and bracing — and John McDermid makes me walk every day. You would be frozen here but I enjoy it — but I miss you my darling. Love to everybody. Am just writing this to catch the boat.
