PREFACE.

An ancestry of sound-bodied, clear-minded, Christian men and women is hardly to be overvalued, and of such calibre were the ancestors of this family. While great satisfaction is found in studying family history, few lines of research tend more to a realization of that little suspected truth, the cousinship of men. The distinction must not be lost between the customary genealogy of one surname, which omits all mention of female branches and is therefore very inadequate as a history of any person, and an ancestral genealogy in which the female equally with the male branches are given careful research and extension, as in the following pages.

The numerical increase of ancestors is surprising, for ten generations include over one thousand ancestors for each living person.

Public and Bible records, manuscripts, and approved genealogical works are the sources of all statements made. The system pursued needs little explanation, the numbers being simply for reference.

Those who have supplied material, and who have allowed me access to private libraries and records, I thank, and express my high appreciation of their kindnesses.

John Guild,¹ our emigrant ancestor in America, came probably from Scotland in 1636, and settled in Dedham, Mass., of which place he was an original grantee; b. 1616 ±; m. 24 June, 1645, to Elizabeth Crooke² of Roxbury; he d. 4 Oct., 1682, and his wife d. 31 Aug., 1669. Freeman, 1643; by trade a weaver.

Captain Samuel Guild,³ a "worthy and serviceable gentleman," son of above John,¹ was one of Capt. Moseley's Company in King Philip's War, 1675; b. 7 Nov., 1647; m. 29 Nov., 1676, to Mary Woodcock,⁴ dau. of Samuel⁵ and Ann⁶ Woodcock; he d. 1 June, 1730. From 1693-1713 selectman in Dedham, delegate to general court 1719, freeman 1678.

Joseph Guild,⁷ yeoman, son of Samuel,³ b. 13 Sep., 1694; m. 4 Dec. 1732, to Hannah Curtis,⁸ of Stoughton; d. 24 Oct., 1751. He was precinct collector of Dedham in 1739. Inventory £1414.

Captain Joseph Guild,⁹ son of Joseph,⁷ was "an honest, upright, energetic citizen" of Dedham; b. 11 May, 1735; m. 28 June, 1758, to Miriam Draper,¹⁰ dau. of Ebenezer Draper¹¹ and Dorothy Child;¹² d. 28 Dec. 1794. In 1775

he was captain of a company of minute men; member of the committee of safety; mustermaster 1775; a selectman and representative.

Calvin Guild,¹⁰ son of Capt. Joseph,⁹ b. 6 July, 1775; m. 6 April, 1800, to Lendamine Draper,³⁰ dau. of Maj. Abijah Draper²⁹ and Desire Foster;⁶⁰ d. 25 Apr., 1858. He was hatter, auctioneer and sheriff in Dedham.

Deacon Calvin Guild,¹¹ son of Calvin¹⁰ of Dedham, b. 22 Nov., 1808; m. 19 May, 1836, to Margaret Taft,³⁴ dau. of Frederick Taft³³ and Abigail Wood,¹¹⁸ of Uxbridge, has for many years been treasurer of institution for savings, parish treasurer, justice of the peace, deacon of the First Orthodox Church.

Nathaniel Grosvenor Guild,¹² son of Calvin,¹¹ was for many years, a successful cotton broker and manufacturer in Providence; b. 17 May, 1837; m. 28 Nov., 1860, to Amey Richmond Humphreys,¹⁵⁷ dau. of James Humphreys¹⁵⁶ and Rebecca Covell Martin.²²⁹

Sarah Metcalf,⁶² dau. of Michael,⁵⁹ m. 4 June, 1677, to Robert Ware,⁶³ of Dedham. She was b. 7 Dec., 1648; d. 30 April, 1717-8, in Wrentham.

Mr. Robert Cushman,⁶⁴ b. 1580 +, Eng., near Canterbury. By trade he was a wool carder, though an educated and refined person. A nonconformist, he removed about 1609, with Mr. John Robinson and others, to Leyden. With John Carver he was deputed to secure permission from the King of England for the church to remove to New England, in which they were finally successful. He was largely instrumental in securing the "Mayflower" and "Speedwell." Robert and family started in the "Mayflower" but on the "Speedwell" proving unseaworthy, he was selected to take charge of those who returned, and bring them on the first vessel to be secured, which was the "Fortune," 1621. Gov. Bradford says Robert Cushman "was as our right hand with the adventurers." For several years he was the agent of the Plymouth Colony in England, and secured their Patent. He d. Jan., 1626; m. 31 July, 1606, in Parish of St. Alphaege, Canterbury, to Sara Reder⁶⁵. They were the parents of

Elder Thomas Cushman,⁶⁶ b. Feb., 1608, in England; m. 1636; d. 11 Dec., 1691, in Plymouth. He came in ship "Fortune" with his parents. He was brought up in Governor Bradford's family; m. Mary Allerton,⁶⁷ dau. of Isaac Allerton⁶⁸ and Mary Norris.⁶⁹ In 1649 he was ordained ruling elder of the Plymouth Church to succeed Elder Brewster, and continued forty-three years as elder until his death, on which occasion the church had a day of humiliation and fasting.

Thomas Cushman,⁷⁰ son of Elder Thomas,⁶⁶ b. 16 Sept., 1637; d. 23 Aug., 1726; m. 16 Oct., 1679, Abigail Fuller⁷¹ of Rehoboth, dau. of Robert Fuller,⁷² bricklayer in Salem (d. 10 May, 1706) and Sarah⁷³ (d. 14 Oct., 1676).

Samuel Cushman,⁷⁴ son of Thomas,⁷⁰ b. 16 July, 1687; m. 8 Dec., 1709, to Fear Corsser⁷⁵ of Plympton; lived in Attleboro, Mass. and had dau. Desire⁷⁶ who m. 17 Sep. 1730, Ebenezer Foster.⁴⁹

Captain Isaac Allerton,⁶⁸ b. 1583, England; m. 4 Nov., 1611, in Leyden; d. 1658-9 in New Haven. "Joined the church in Leyden, coming from London." He came to America in 1620 in the "Mayflower" with his wife Mary Norris⁶⁹ of Newbury, Eng. (b. —; d. 25 Feb., 1621) and dau. Mary⁶⁷ who m. Elder Thos. Cushman.⁶⁶ Isaac was the wealthiest man in Plymouth Colony, the first assistant or Lieut. Gov. and fifth to sign the compact in the cabin of the "Mayflower." Mary Cushman⁶⁷ d. 1699, the last survivor of those who came in the "Mayflower."

Margaret Taft,⁸⁴ dau. of Frederic,⁸³ b. 31 May, 1806; m. 19 May, 1836, to Deacon Calvin Guild¹¹ of Dedham, Mass. She d. Jan. 23, 1891.

Again coming to New England he settled near Stonington.

During King Philip's war he was a leader in ten expeditions against the Indians, in one of which he captured Canochet.

CONCLUSION.

The ancestors immigrated from England, Scotland and Wales, mostly before 1650, all before 1670. Their descendants led quiet, healthful lives, and many held military and civil rank, and were persons of distinction.

About 70% have been of the Orthodox, 25% of the Baptist and 5% of the Friends persuasion. Oil paintings exist of 11, 83, 84, 118, 156, 157, 239, silhouettes of 30, 155, 166, 167, 238, 298, and photographs of 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 84, 156, 157, 239. Autographs of most are in existence. Few heirlooms have been more carefully preserved than old silver or furniture; of which much is identified and is highly interesting. Coats of arms have not received much of my attention, but I have some ten crests, etc., which seem to belong to families here named.

From one hundred and fifty known lives the following average longevity is deduced, viz.: ancestors of No. 11, $67\frac{3}{8}$ years, No. 84, $69\frac{3}{8}$ years, No. 156, $69\frac{4}{8}$ years, and No. 239, 66 years: general average $67\frac{4}{8}$ years. I see no grounds for supposing the later generations shorter-lived than the earlier. Judged by the twenty-six more recently deceased ancestors about whom information was to be had, there is in the family no hereditary weakness or disease. Nos. 10 and 83 died, it is recorded, of cancer, but as they were 84 and 88 years of age respectively, it seems that extreme age must have had much to do with

their decease. Nos. 155, 167 and 298 died of consumption, the result of accident and not perceptibly inherited.

Birth, marriage and sex ratios are of value and interest, but two comparisons are offered to illustrate: the six generations of Guilds give average families of eight children, 63% male, 37% female, of whom 55% married. The seven generations of Martins give average families of nine children, 50% male and 50% female; 66% of whom married.

Though very unlikely, it is but just to state that there is a small possibility of error in the parentage given for Nos. 48 and 63. Evidence is strongly in favor of what is given in the text.

The charts are inserted for clearness and to show the generation of an ancestor, and include third to eighth only. Most of the lines can be carried to the ninth and tenth. E indicates that the ancestry is partially known in the mother country. The author will be indebted to any one for corrections and additions.
