

A STATEMENT of what constitutes a *full set* of Congressional Documents, from the First Congress, held in 1789 and 1790, to the 2d Session of the 21st Congress, held in 1830 and 1831, (inclusive.)

The re-print, now making by MESSRS. GALES & SEATON, Commences with the First Congress, and ends with the Thirteenth—the last Session of which was held in 1814 and 1815.

NOTE.—Two of the volumes of House Documents, and one of the volumes of Senate Documents of the first Session of the 14th Congress are folios—and three of the volumes of House Documents, one of the volumes of Senate Documents of the 2d Session of the 14th Congress are folios—all the other volumes of the 14th are octavos—and all the other volumes of the whole series from the 15th to the 21st Congresses, inclusive, are royals, Svo. The receipts and expenditures of the Government are published every Session until the last, in folios. The last Session is in octavo, and they will continue to be published in that form.

NOTE 2.—The foregoing statement of the Documents of each Session, will enable any one to ascertain whether the sets are full, and if not, to know the deficiencies. On examining the volumes it will be perceived that those of some Sessions are indiscriminately marked *State Papers*, without designating whether they are of the House of Representatives, or the Senate—this can be known by looking at the Title Page. The Reports of Committees of the Senate are always bound up with the Senate Documents. Those of the other House are bound up with the House Documents, as far as through the first Session of the 16th Congress, and from that time are in separate volumes, as per statement.

A full and perfect set of Congressional Documents, from the first Session of the 14th Congress, held in 1815 and 1816, to the 2d Session of the 21st Congress, held in 1830 and 1831, inclusive, consisting of 228 volumes, at \$3 per volume, in the binding usually furnished by the United States, or at \$3 50 cents per volume, uniformly and neatly bound in good law binding.

Sets of Documents for particular Congresses, or separate Sessions, or odd volumes at the same rates as above.
