Furnace

ERECTED 1784-1785 by Peter Grubb (great-grandfather of the present owner), a son of Peter Grubb, the great pioneer and discoverer of the Cornwall Iron Hills and the builder of the Furnace there and the Forge at Hopewell on Hammer Creek, where he lived. The Furnace stands to the east of the Mansion House, at the foot of a most picturesque ravine on the banks of the "Chickasalunga" and after being operated continuously and successfully as a charcoal iron furnace by the Grubb family for a round century, went out of blast in 1885—a generation after its neighbors, "Elizabeth" and "Hopewell" and "Speedwell" Forges on Hammer Creek, ceased to be operated.

Mansion

ERECTED in 1800, on a knoll rising out of the foot-hills of the "South Mountain," along the highway leading from Lancaster through Manheim and Cornwall to Lebanon, by Henry Bates Grubb, owner of Mt. Hope Furnace, Mt. Vernon Furnace, Codoras Iron Works, and the thousands of acres of land surrounding each, as well as joint owner of Hopewell Forges and Cornwall Mine and Furnace.

Church

TO the South, and separated from Furnace and Mansion by a Park, of Mid-England appearance, stands "Hope Church," built in 1848 by Harriet Amelia Buckley Grubb, daughter of Daniel Buckley, Iron master, of "Brooke Forge" in Salisbury Township, and widow of Henry Bates Grubb; since largely maintained and supported by the Grubb Family; lately enlarged and improved by Miss Daisy Elizabeth Brooke Grubb, the present owner of the estates.

"Hope Church" is the mother church of the Episcopal Churches at Manheim, Lebanon and Colebrook, and with the ancestral home, receives, with the tenderest solicitude and affection, the care of our most gracious hostess on this occasion.






FRONT PLATE OF STOVE. CORNWALL FURNACE 1772.




CORNWALL FURNACE, 1776.

LANCASTER, JANUARY 1, 1902.

Dear Sir:

The Lancaster County Historical Society was reorganized in the spring of 1896. The first meeting was held in June of that year, and monthly ever since, except during July and August of each year. The purpose of the Society, as expressed in its charter of incorporation, is "to promote the discovery, collection, preservation and publication of the history, historical records and data of and relating to Lancaster City and County, the collection and preservation of books, newspapers, maps, genealogies, portraits, paintings, relics, engravings, manuscripts, letters, journals and any or all materials which may establish or illustrate such history, the growth and progress of population, wealth, education, agriculture, arts, manufactures and commerce of this City and County."

During the past five years the Society has moved steadily forward along the lines indicated. During that time the membership has increased from a few persons of both sexes to more than one hundred. At almost every meeting one or more original papers have been read, bearing on subjects of local history. In all, upwards of 100 separate papers have been called forth, many of them of great value, presenting many facts before unknown relating to our county's early history and clearing up disputed points already on record. These various papers have been published in a newspaper and also in pamphlet form and distributed to all the members. They are also sent in exchange to other historical societies in this State and to libraries in other States. Their value has been widely recognized, and many demands have come for them from persons engaged in historical research in distant localities.

The Society has also accumulated, by the liberality of its members and through the generous donations of its friends, a valuable collection of books, deeds, manuscripts and other articles, all of which are deposited in suitable cases in the Society's rooms, which

for the present are located in the Young Men's Christian Association building.

The Society has in its membership men and women who give much of their time to its interests and welfare. No salaries are paid to any of the officers, the members rendering their services for the good of the cause without remuneration of any kind. The money obtained from membership dues and initiation fees is devoted to the payment of rent, the publication of the Society's proceedings and such incidental expenses as arise from time to time.

Lancaster county presents an ideal field for the operations of a society such as this. The fourth to be organized after the founding of the Province, the home of many of the most distinguished men in the history of our State and the scene of many historical events before and after the revolutionary period, it should have a large and prosperous historical organization. It has already done much, but much more remains to be done. One hundred earnest men and women can do much to further its aims, but two or three hundred could do much more.

To increase its membership and extend its usefulness is the object of this personal appeal. The purposes to which it is devoted appeal to all intelligent and liberal-minded persons who have the best interests of the community at heart and it is believed if the cause is properly brought before the progressive people of the county they will greatly increase the membership. The initiation fee is \$1, and the annual dues \$1, the total charges being \$2 the first year and \$1 annually thereafter. These are not large sums, and as members receive the publications of the Society free of charge, they are in reality getting back the worth of their money.

The Society is not an experiment. The five volumes of "Papers and Proceedings" already published, show the good work it has done during the past five years. That is the best evidence of what it purposes to accomplish in the future with a larger membership and more ample means.

It therefore comes before the public with this appeal. Every citizen is proud of his locality; proud of its past since the times of Penn; proud of its Revolutionary history; proud of its wealth and progress and of its notable men and women. Every person who receives this appeal is earnestly requested to participate in the good work the Society is doing by becoming a member. The cost is little and the results may be great.

The Society solicits and invites contributions of all kinds along the lines already indicated, from such persons who may have them, and be willing to add them to its collections.

The meetings of the Society are held on the first Friday of each month (July and August excepted). These meetings are free and the public is cordially invited to attend them.






