


## ❁      Auburn, New York.      ❁

**A**UBURN, the capital of Cayuga County, is unsurpassed for manufacturing and residence purposes, being situated on the Owasco River in the heart of the famous "lake country" of central New York. She is practically surrounded by lakes; Cayuga on the west, Ontario on the north, Skaneateles on the east, and on the south her own Owasco, all accessible by either steam or trolley lines. One cannot imagine a location more desirable. With her broad, well-shaded streets, her attractive residences, her fine lake and her charming country drives, she is justly entitled to her reputation of being one of the most beautiful cities in the country.

But her fame rests not upon great beauty alone. Auburn is proud of her manufacturing industries, surpassing most cities of her size in the quantity and quality of her manufactured products, which are shipped to all parts of the known world. She has 350 plants, in which are employed over 6,000 persons.

Auburn has splendid railroad facilities. The New York Central & Hudson River Railroad and the Lehigh Valley Railroad are rival trunk lines passing through the city, thus affording low rates of transportation, and enabling the manufacturer and merchant to compete with any city in the country.



Auburn has a population of 34,000, having made a gain of over 3,000 within the past year. An unusually large number of new buildings have recently been erected, including several large handsome business blocks, containing up-to-date stores and offices, and an ideal music hall and ball room.

In educational facilities, Auburn offers advantages equal to any city of her size in the United States. Her public schools, parochial schools, colleges and libraries have an excellent reputation. Half a million dollars is invested in school property, and one hundred and fifty teachers are employed in twenty school buildings, including a handsome new High School. This has a curriculum academic and classical that is efficient and practical, thus enabling a pupil to enter the primary schools at the age of six and twelve years later graduate from the High School prepared for college.

“The Auburn School of Business,” established in 1890, is a popular institution, where thorough instruction is given in book-keeping, commercial law, banking, penmanship, shorthand, type-writing, etc. It is open from September to June each year, with evening classes in session from October to April.


The Auburn Theological Seminary, founded in 1820, occupies a site near the heart of the city covering about ten acres of ground, laid out in a beautiful park profuse with ornamental







trees, shrubs and flowers, and its large stone buildings command the admiration of all visitors. The institution is handsomely endowed, has an able corps of instructors, and is in a flourishing condition, with an attendance of about one hundred students. The library, in the Dodge-Morgan building, contains about 26,000 volumes and 8,000 pamphlets and is open for the free use of the public, as well as of the faculty and students.

The Seymour Library Association maintains a free public circulating library, established in 1876; through the munificence of the late James S. Seymour. The library, containing about



15,000 volumes, is at present located in the Auburn Savings Bank building; but a beautiful library building is in process of erection in Genesee street, which, with the site, is a gift to the association by Willard E. Case of this city. There is also a free reading room and library supported by the Woman's Educational and Industrial Union, for the special use of women; and for a number of years past a free reading room for men has been provided, at his own expense, by General William H. Seward.

The *Auburn Daily Advertiser* and *The Auburn Bulletin* are excellent daily newspapers; and there are also published in Auburn four weekly papers, all having large circulations.




LOOKING NORTHWEST FROM COURT HOUSE DOME.





Auburn has twenty-one churches—five Presbyterian, five Methodist, three Baptist, three Roman Catholic, two Episcopal, one Universalist, one Dutch Reformed, one Disciples. Most of the edifices are of stone or brick and are comparatively new and handsome in design, there being invested in church property the sum of one million dollars.

The Auburn Young Men's Christian Association is one of her most popular and helpful institutions, and occupies a handsome building of its own in the center of the city. It has a membership of about four hundred, and maintains four departments of work—physical, educational, social and religious. The physical department has a well-equipped gymnasium, including an excellent swimming pool and baths, and also a magnificent Athletic Field, which in winter is flooded and used as an ice rink. The educational department maintains a library and reading room, and numerous evening classes in various branches of study, while the other departments carry on very successful work. The Association has the proud distinction of possessing a beautiful wooded park, adjoining the Athletic Field. This fronts on Swift and Mary streets and is open to the free use of the public. Both field and park were the gift of the Misses Willard of Auburn.

The Auburn City Hospital, Home for the Friendless, Cayuga Asylum for Destitute Children and Auburn Orphan Asylum are some of the monuments of charity which are permanently established in Auburn, and their large handsome buildings, with their equipment and maintenance, are suggestive of the benevolence of her citizens. There are a number of state buildings at Auburn, including a handsome Armory, built of native limestone and finished in ash, at an expense of about \$90,000, and which is the headquarters of the Wheeler Rifles, or Second Separate Company. This company enlisted in the Spanish war as Company M, 3d N. Y. Volunteers, and the illustration on the opposite page shows their return home on the afternoon of September 13, 1898.



The State Prison and the Woman's Prison are of great interest and commercial value to Auburn and places of attraction to visitors. One of the handsomest buildings in Auburn is the United States Court House and Post Office. It occupies a beautiful site on Genesee street, opposite the county buildings. It is built of gray stone and red brick and was erected in 1888, the appropriation for the same being about \$250,000. Auburn enjoys all the advantages of a free postal delivery. The County Court House and the City Hall are handsome buildings of Grecian architecture. The present County Clerk's Office was erected in 1882. It is of brick, three stories high, and contains the offices of the County Clerk, County Treasurer and Superintendent of Poor, and the County Judge's Chambers and the Supervisors' Rooms. A modern Jail has recently been erected in the rear of the county buildings, containing also the residence of the Sheriff. All are centrally located and convenient to the business portion of the city.



One of the great features of Auburn as a manufacturing and residential city is its magnificent water supply, which is obtained from Owasco Lake, a body of water several hundred feet deep and covering 7,400 acres. An analysis shows the water to be practically pure, an advantage which cannot be overlooked in locating a home. The many thriving industries located on the banks of the Owasco River, which runs through the city, prove the benefits to be derived from a splendid water power.

The City of Auburn owns its own water plant, operated on the "Holly System," and having fifty miles of street mains. The supply pipes extend far out into the lake, thus furnishing an abundance of pure water for domestic and other purposes, at low rates.

The Auburn Gas Light Company and the Auburn Electric Light, Heat and Power Company supply the light of the city at reasonable rates. The latter company has the contract for all public lighting, and also furnishes steam heat to many buildings in the heart of the city.

The competing lines of the Auburn Telephone Company (Automatic) and the Empire State Telephone Company enable subscribers to obtain the benefit of unusually low rates, with good service. Excellent telegraphic service is furnished by the Western Union Telegraph Company and the Postal Telegraph Cable Company. The American Express Company and the United States Express Company are also competitors in their lines.








AUBURN CITY HOSPITAL.




The beautiful Burtis Opera House, opened in 1889, and Music Hall, recently erected by Col. E. D. Metcalf, afford ample accommodations for the best lines of entertainment which are patronized by the amusement-loving portion of the population.

Auburn is splendidly endowed with banking facilities, having four commercial and two savings banks. A detailed statement as to their capital, resources, etc., will be found on other pages accompanying the illustrations of the several institutions.

Particular mention should be made of the city's paid Fire Department, which employs thirty-eight men, of whom twenty-six devote their entire time to the work, day and night, except forty-eight hours a month allowed to each man. Twelve horses are required to move the apparatus of the department, consisting of one chemical engine, one hook and ladder wagon, three hose wagons and one supply wagon. The men and horses are all well trained and disciplined. The Game-well system of fire alarm telegraph extends over the city, providing an important safeguard to the lives and property of the citizens.

The Auburn City Railway Company operates many miles of electric trolley lines, which afford rapid transit to all sections of the city, and include two lines to Owasco Lake, terminating in Lakeside






JAMES STREET SCHOOL.



HIGH SCHOOL AND CENTRAL GRAMMAR SCHOOL.





A most noticeable feature of Auburn is the large number of neat separate houses occupied and owned by men and women of the so-called laboring class. There is no tenement house district nor any squalid portion of the city.


A rich agricultural region of a diversified character surrounds the city, cheaply supplying its markets with nearly every product and adding greatly to its export trade.

Park, a high-class pleasure resort. The company's equipment is new and of the best character. A new line is being built to Skaneateles Lake, and one is projected to Cayuga Lake.

Within the city limits are several large quarries, where blue and gray limestone can be obtained in almost unlimited quantities. The traffic is extensive, shipments being made to all parts of the country. The city owns one of these quarries, from which it procures the material for macadamizing its eighty miles of fine streets, for which the city is especially noted. There are also at hand extensive supplies of brick-clay and fine building-sand, to the great advantage of all building operations.






In point of healthfulness, Auburn takes very high rank among the cities of the land. The locality is subject to no prevailing diseases, the city is naturally well drained and its sanitary condition is regulated by an efficient Board of Health.

The Cayuga County Agricultural Society maintains large fair grounds in the west end of the city, in connection with which is a half mile race track.


The city abounds in social and fraternal organizations. The City Club owns a clubhouse on Genesee street, near the public buildings, the Auburn Cyclers occupy handsome rooms in the center of

the city and the various masonic and other orders have sumptuous quarters in the new Metcalf Building, the Columbus Block and elsewhere.

A magnificent eminence in the southwestern part of the city known as Fort Hill is the site of an Indian fortification of prehistoric origin. This earthwork and the surrounding hills and dales have been preserved and developed as a most beautiful cemetery.



VIEWS IN FORT HILL CEMETERY.




OWASCO RIVER POWER.—“THE BIG DAM.”

The advantages of Auburn as a manufacturing city are almost unlimited. A few of the larger plants are shown in the illustrations, but to obtain a correct idea of the amount of manufacturing done in Auburn one must take a tour along the Owasco River, which runs through the heart of the city and furnishes the splendid water power utilized by many manufactories on its banks. The head of this power is Owasco Lake, which is 770 feet above the tide, is nearly twelve miles long and has an average width of over one mile, with a depth of several hundred feet. The watershed has an area of about 190 square miles, including the lake, with an average annual rainfall of 45 inches, of which it is estimated 50 per cent. is collected into the lake as a reservoir. The Owasco River is eleven miles in length and empties into the Seneca River, having made a descent of 340 feet, mostly in the first seven miles. There are nine dams within the city limits, distributed along the river at natural falls, with a total height of 150 feet. The second and sixth dams have been illustrated on the preceding pages. The average flow of water as determined by actual measurement over these dams, as the wheels are now adjusted, varies from 8,000 to 12,000 cubic feet per minute; while in the spring months this volume can be multiplied several times, all of which runs to waste at present. The actual value of water power now in use is estimated at three million dollars. There is as much water power running to waste within a few miles of the center of the City of Auburn as is in use by all of its manufactories combined. This may seem a rash statement in an age when water power is so

valuable, and it may be asked why it is not “harnessed” and put to practical use. 





## Auburn's Leading Grocer.



Now let us make a visit to one of Auburn's representative food depots. In the center of the city, within a few steps of the junction of all the present street car lines, is the main store of C. G. Meaker, the leading dealer in groceries. Taking either of the two large

entrances we pass between fine show windows, rich in their varied colors of delicacies, and enter the spacious salesroom, 30 by 90 ft. The furnishings are of oak, with bins and canisters of black and gold. These latter, as well as the scales, are from Troemner, who makes all the scales for the U. S. mint. Great attention is paid to cleanliness; for this purpose glass and wire screens are freely used. The air is kept cool and free from flies in summer by the use of large electric fans. Modern labor-saving devices are also used to allow of the greatest ease and economy possible in handling the loads of food stuffs that are constantly passing through this






business artery. A long slide or chute is used for unloading goods in the rear, another connects the main floor with the shipping department in the basement, while two elevators lift goods to the main floor and to the delivery wagons at the curb in front of the store. These arrangements, besides being conducive to speed and economy in handling goods, aid largely in keeping the salesroom clean and unobstructed. Mr. Meaker also has several stores in the residence portions of the city, each doing a thriving trade



in its immediate neighborhood. This business, now approaching \$200,000 trade per annum, is the result of six years' continuous and energetic work, backed by the efforts of the best help to be obtained and surrounded by a thriving and appreciative public.



### Barker, Griswold & Company.

One of the characteristic features of Auburn is that of permanency, and the accompanying cut represents the business home of one of the best known firms in the state. The business was established by F. L. Griswold in 1838, in a store just east of the corner of North Street. In 1844 he formed a partnership with Abijah Fitch and moved to No. 89, the west half of present store. In 1852 Mr. Fitch retired and his son, Nelson Fitch, became the partner until 1863, when C. P. Fitch and J. L. Barker (the senior member of the present firm) were admitted. Early in 1867 Mr. Nelson Fitch retired and the late F. H. Griswold became a member, and in 1874 Charles P. Fitch sold his interest. In the beginning of 1877, the store No. 87 was added, making the double store since occupied, and C. P. Mosher was associated with the firm. The next change was by the death of Mr. F. L. Griswold, in December of 1879. The business was continued by the survivors under the old name of F. L. Griswold & Co., until 1884, when it was changed to the present title. In 1893 C. L. Griswold and G. F. Eldred were added to the copartnership, and in July, 1898, Mr. F. H. Griswold died, being the second death in the firm's history.

The improved front to the building was put in in 1899, and is now one of the most modern establishments in our city.



### **The Beautiful Owasco.**



The plant has now 25 sets of cards and 106 broad looms, and manufactures fine Woolen Goods for Men's wear.




