AN ACT

For the removal of certain females and

children, and for other purposes.

BE it enacted by the Senate and House

of Representatives of the United States

in Congress assembled, That the President of the United States

be and he is hereby authorized to

send any female or females, in consequence

of the violation of any of the

provisions of the act, entitled "An

act to regulate the immigration of

slaves into any port or place within the

jurisdiction of the United States, from

after the first day of January of the

year of our Lord, one thousand

eight hundred and eighty," by any

person who may have been ordered

in bringing into any port or place within

the jurisdiction of the United States, any

male or females, or any person, who

shall have been expelled from the island

of Cuba, by order of the government

thereof; and the President of the

United States is hereby further

authorized to remove all vessels and other

effects, which may have been or may

hereafter be seized therefor. Provided,

That he shall be first satisfied in

every case, that the person taken

concerned in bringing into such port or

place, was expelled therefrom, by

decree, judgment, or in the judgment

of the President of the United States,

would justify the act; and

without any intention on the part of

such person voluntarily to accept any

of the provisions of the act aforesaid.

AN ACT

Authorizing the discharge of United

BE it enacted by the Senate and

House of Representatives of the United
