




Sergeant Marian Post, the camp bugler, can blow every call but "Retreat."

Miss Lucy Hewitt, the snare drummer, who makes break fast rolls:




Sergeant Helen Culver Kerr, who can tell an old saw or wield a new one with equal facility. As a camp carpenter she's equal to any odd job.
