

THE BOMB BREAKERS ON THE BATTLEFIELD OF FRICOURT—This photograph of the beginning of the British attack on Fricourt at the outset of the Allied advance in the Somme sector gives a true picture of the modern battlefield. It resembles a surf battered beach rather than a scene in the world's greatest war. High in the sky are bursting shells from the British batteries in the rear. The low rolling smoke clouds are from the explosions of trench bombs and hand grenades. The smoke almost merges with the trenches, in which may be seen the black figures of the German soldiers. © International Film Service.


