PARIS, June 4.

The Count and Countess of Legation went yesterday to the Earl of Constance where they dined.

HAGUE, May 15.

The French troops belonging to the divisions of Barbon and Dubois which formed part of the Expedition of Brno have arrived in our Republic. They will remain in our pay, and be under the command of general Victor.

May 26.

Government has issued orders to the Departmental Administrations to furnish all the editors of newspapers from speaking about either the marine or land forces of the State.

The project of our constitution has just been published. Its superiority over that which we have at present, and which it is to replace, secures it a good reception from the nation...

Yesterday the plan of the new constitution, together with the report of the committee, was published. It consists of 177 articles, and is divided into the following sections:

- 1. On the right of voting. 2. The College of National Electors. 3. The Legislative Body. 4. The Senate. 5. The Executive. 6. The Finances. 6. Departmental Administration. 7. The Judicial Power. 9. The Courts of Justice in the Departments. And finally, 10. General Regulations relative to Religion, Public Instruction, Agriculture, Trade, &c.

The report of the committee consists of eighteen pages. Among other things it is suggested, that when the Legislative Body shall have decreed that the plan of the Constitution shall be presented to the people, a billlet shall be left at the house of every active citizen, in which he shall write yes or no, furnished with his name, according as he wishes to accept or reject the new Constitution.

The Director Van Zwinden has prohibited against the plan the new Constitution. Admiral De Winter has left his ship and gone to Amsterdam.

PETERSBURGH, May 18.

The embargo on the English ships, and the requisition on English property, was taken off yesterday. The Russian Admiralty has received orders to get all the British ships in the Russian harbours repaired at the expense of Russia. The 24 ships at Riga, which were given to the crews of Zerkow, to discharge a demand which they made upon the English government, have likewise been returned to their lawful owners.

NAVY DEPARTMENT, June 24, 1861. Regulations for ascertaining and paying the Pensioners, and payment of pensions on the Navy establishment of the United States.

It is a pension the party must prosecute in the Secretary of the Navy a certificate from the commander of the ship or vessel on board of which he sustained the injury, which insupportable loss or disability, and from the commanding officer of the marine corps or commander of a detachment as the case may require; in the latter case however, if the injury was sustained on board of a vessel, a certificate of the surgeon will also be required, if on shore, that of some respectable medical character of the place of the injury where the party was acting in the line of his duty, specifying the nature and amount of the disability, the capacity or fitness in which he stood, and the monthly pay to which he was entitled at the time of sustaining the injury. On such certificate being produced, and it being ascertained to the satisfaction of the Secretary of the Navy, that the disability still exists and is likely to continue, he will at once direct the applicant to be placed on the books of the Loan Office of the State, in which he resides, and the loan officer will make the payment half yearly, viz. on the 1st of January, and 1st of July, to the party in person or his legal attorney using his hire or retainer as his disability. But if the pension can be paid on a power of attorney, the loan officer must have it ascertained by the certificate of a Justice of the peace of the county where the party resides, that he was living, and that his disability continued, in the month next preceding that of the date of the attorney, and the party must transmit the same to the Secretary of the Navy with the necessary receipts as usually furnished by him.

It is to be placed on the pension list must reside at the Navy Office a certificate in the following form: I, the undersigned, do hereby being disabled by the service of the United States, on board of ship of war while acting in the line of his duty, is entitled to receive \$ dollars per month from the care of the officer of the date of payable half yearly, on the 1st of January and 1st of July in every year during the continuance of such disability, to commence from the day of The same will be paid to him in person or to his legal power of attorney. But no money will be paid as a power of attorney, unless the said A. B. has filed to the loan officer of said State, the certificate of a Justice of the peace of the county where he resides, that he was living, and that his disability continued, in the month next preceding that in which the bill continued to be made and his disability is present.
