LEGHORN, August 7.

The American consul resident here has been directed by Mr. Calverly, the consul of the United States at Tripoli, to give all assistance to the following:—  
"Consulate of the United States of America, at Tunis, July 28th."  
"The King of Tripoli having declared war against the United States, our government has sent a fleet to prevent the receipt from injuring our commerce. In consequence we are to inform the agents of all powers at sea with us, that Tripoli is now blockaded by the United American States, and that every ship whatever, which shall attempt to enter the port, will be treated conformably to the laws of nations applicable to such cases."

LONDON, August 23.

Lord Nelson arrived yesterday morning in the Dawn, with his squadron. We are informed that he will call on Monday at Middleburgh, where he lay to the windward. On Tuesday he went on board a cutter to reconnoitre Flushing and the adjacent coast; but, it is rumoured, found it too strong to be attacked with any probability of success.  
The island of Zante has been taken possession of by the English, at the request of the inhabitants.  
Sir J. B. Warren's arrival on the Italian coast has wholly changed the face of affairs with respect to the siege of Porto Ferrajo. The French had sent three frigates to cover the siege. As soon, however, as we are informed that the appearance of the British frigates attempted to make their escape.
