

# VAUX AND BOURESCHES STORMED BY VICTORIOUS AMERICANS



THE VILLAGE OF BOURESCHES, AT THE EDGE OF THE FAMOUS BELLEAU WOOD AND NORTHWEST OF CHATEAU-TIERRY, IMMEDIATELY AFTER ITS CAPTURE BY THE AMERICANS ON JUNE 7. This Remarkable Photograph, Taken from a Military Airplane, Shows Not Only the Effect on the Village of American Artillery Fire, but that of the German Barrage Laid Down South of the Village to Prevent the American Advance. VAUX, JUST WEST OF CHATEAU-TIERRY, STORMED AND CAPTURED BY THE AMERICAN MARINES ON JULY 1 AFTER A TWELVE-HOUR BOMBARDMENT BY AMERICAN ARTILLERY. To Drive Out the Germans 15,000 Shells Were Thrown Into the Area, the Marines Finally Capturing 400 German Machine Gunners, Hidden in Cellars, the Exits Being Closed by American Fire. On the Left Can Be Seen the Edge of Bois de la Roche, Captured at the Same Time, and to the Right Lies the Famous Hill 204. German Trenches Running Both North and South of the Village Can Also Be Seen. This Photograph Was Taken Half an Hour After the Germans Retreated, and, Though Not Visible, American Marines with Machine Guns Were Then Stationed in the Edge of the Woods and Along the Railroad Track.
