One of Germany's largest passenger carrying airplanes shows in the foreground. On the right is a view showing the interior of the passenger compartment of the big dirigible. A score or more air tourists, comfortably seated in wicker chairs, enjoy the wonderful panorama without the necessity of being garbed in the customary aviator's leather coat, helmet and goggles.



Had the war continued a few weeks longer here's how the German capital would have looked to the pilots of American bombing planes. It is perhaps the first photograph of Berlin from the air to be published in this country. The Reichstag shows in the center foreground, to the left the River Spree, to the right the famous Brandenburg Gate and beyond the celebrated Unter den Linden.
