

CIRCUIT OF THE WORLD'S HISTORY.

1881 ought to have been a year of peace and good will, for it witnessed the completion of a great religious work—the revision of the King James Version of the New Testament. Yet the annals are stained with blood. In two capitals there has been dastardly assassination; in two weak States there have been active military campaigns—one of them a wanton act of foreign aggression and the other the humiliating expiation of a national crime; and in the unhappiest quarter of the globe, distracted Ireland, the olive branch of remedial legislation has been thrust aside and the conspiracy against rent paying has been aggravated by midnight murders and the worst forms of agrarian crime. Washington has been the point of commanding interest to which the eyes of mankind have been directed during the year. The assassination of the President of a free people, more atrocious in itself than the murder of a despotic Czar, was rendered more memorable by an agonizing struggle for life and the prayers and sympathies of all nations. Unhappily, the crime and the penalty are not brought within the compass of a single year. The Guiteau trial, a vulgar combination

of peep-show and bear-garden, is dragging on still, exciting the contemptuous criticism of foreigners and the passionate indignation of Americans.

THE UNITED STATES.

July 2—September 19. The American year begins and ends with these dates; for although it has been a busy and prosperous twelvemonth for a nation of fifty millions, the overmastering importance of the assassination and death of the President obscures all else. Honored as never American was honored, mourned as never sovereign or ruler was mourned, he soared to the highest levels of mortal reputation and was prayed for in hundreds of thousands of households at home and abroad as never man was prayed for before, until at last he went to his own place, the noblest American of his time. Heroism and martyrdom crowned a career unique in modern history—a career that has given a new impulse to the vital energies of American character, and set before our people a new type of self-development, virile citizenship, civic virtue, practical statesmanship and moral consciousness in public station. He has made it easier for an American to be a useful, conscientious citizen. He has enabled his country to forget for a season that there is a North and a South. He has brought the nations of the earth closer together. His memory is embalmed for future generations.

James A. Garfield was inaugurated President of the United States on March 4. He strove to conciliate both wings of the National Republican Convention. He chose as his chief adviser James G. Blaine. Of the seven members of his Cabinet he took four from the main body of the Republican party that nominated him, and three from the powerful faction that opposed him. Immediately after the inauguration the President was beset by hundreds and thousands of place-hunters. Such a vast throng of office-seekers had not been seen in Washington in many years. Among them was an insignificant creature of inordinate self-esteem, malevolence, assurance and depravity, named Guiteau, unnoticed then as he bragged of his political services and mistook Washington politeness for personal influence, but destined to become the most craven and despicable of murderers. The first question the President had to decide was whether he should summon the House of Representatives as well as the Senate, the preceding Congress having neglected to dispose of important business. Throughout its closing session, the XLVith Congress had debated ineffectually bills to fund the debt at a lower rate, to appoint a tariff commission, and to appoint surgeons for the physical examination of pensioners. The President wisely determined to repair the neglect of a Democratic Congress by an unusually effective Administration and not to reopen the National debating school unnecessarily. Meanwhile the Republican and Democratic members of the Senate were engaged in a struggle over the appointment of the committees and the officers of that body. The division was so close that a deadlock followed, Senator Mahone, of Virginia, who had been elected as a Readjuster Democrat, voting with the Republicans. About this time the insignificant creature named Guiteau was snubbed for his impudence and impudence in pressing his fantastic claims.

The President had been able to reconcile all the leading men of his

party save one man. To that man he had accorded a special audience at Mentor, and had nominated one of his followers for a first-class foreign mission and had taken another into the Cabinet. On March 23 he nominated several political friends of Senator Conkling for offices in New-York. On the following day he sent in the names of several representatives of the majority of the Chicago Convention, who had been opponents of that Senator. The chief of these nominations was that of State Senator Robertson for Collector at New-York. The confirmation of the second list of nominations was strenuously resisted by the Senator and his deputy. They declared that they had not been consulted, and endeavored to bully or wheedle the Senate into acknowledging that courtesy to them required the rejection of the nominations. For many weeks they succeeded in postponing action on the nominations, the President stoutly refusing to withdraw them. On May 3 a caucus of the Republican Senators was held, at which it was decided to vote upon the uncontested nominations for office. The President, believing that the nominations in which he was specially interested would be hung up in committee until winter, withdrew all except that of Mr. Robertson. Public opinion condemned factional resistance to the President's will and gradually forced the Senate to face the question. Foreseeing the confirmation of Mr. Robertson the New-York Senators on May 16 resigned their offices. In a long letter addressed to Governor Cornell they described minutely their conflict with the President and asked the judgment of the people of the State on their conduct. Two days later the Senate Committee on Commerce reported Mr. Robertson's nomination favorably and the Senate at once confirmed it. The same week the Senate adjourned. The resignations of the Senators had created astonishment rather than excitement. The insignificant creature named Guiteau began to look about for a pistol.

POSTAL REFORM AND REFUNDING.

The adjournment of the Senate left the Administration free to give all its attention to the frauds disclosed in the Star Route service of the Post Office Department, and also to the refunding operations. Through fraudulent contracts the Government had been robbed of many millions of dollars. The President directed the Postmaster-General and the Attorney-General to pursue those who had defrauded the Government with all the weapons of the Courts. While evidence was being secured against the thieves the Postmaster-General cancelled many of the fraudulent contracts and thus decreased the cost of the service \$364,144 yearly. At the same time the rate of interest on nearly \$600,000,000 of the National debt was reduced with the consent of the bondholders. This vast financial operation was accomplished by the Secretary of the Treasury after the failure of Congress to pass laws that were considered necessary for the funding of the debt. When the XLVIth Congress met in December, 1880, it had been informed that 5 per cent bonds amounting to \$469,651,050, and 6 per cent bonds amounting to \$203,573,750, or a total of \$673,224,800, were redeemable. Several bills were introduced for funding these bonds at a lower rate of interest. A bill was passed on March 2, 1881, authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to sell \$400,000,000 of bonds and \$300,000,000 in certificates for the funding of the redeemable bonds. Bonds and certificates of the new issue were each to bear 3 per cent interest. The bill had been stoutly opposed by the National banks owing to its requirement that they should deposit the proposed 3 per cent bonds as security for their circulation, and also collect their own notes for redemption. These provisions they were convinced would deprive them of all chance of making money. Many surrendered their circulation; causing a sudden contraction of the currency and great financial stringency. A commercial panic was feared for several weeks. Public alarm was at last allayed by President Hayes's vetoing the bill on March 3, chiefly on the ground that it would impair the efficiency of the National bank system. The Administration of President Garfield had thus been left apparently without the means of lowering the interest charge. Secre-

tary Windom, however, by taking advantage of existing laws, executed the great task. He persuaded the owners of the redeemable bonds to exchange them for bonds bearing only 3½ per cent interest. When he began his refunding operations there were \$199,690,400 in 6 per cent bonds; of these \$178,055,150 were continued at 3½ per cent, and \$17,635,250 were redeemed. There were \$439,841,350 in 5 per cent bonds; of which \$401,504,900 were continued, and \$38,336,450 were redeemed. The amount of bonds continued was \$579,560,050; amount redeemed, \$55,971,700; making a grand total of \$635,531,750. The cost of the entire operation was only \$10,000; the advantage to the Treasury of Secretary Windom's operations over the refunding measures proposed by Congress would amount to \$7,227,799 the first year; and permanently to \$5,777,899 yearly. The reduction of interest by the refunding and redemption of bonds amounted to \$16,826,192 25. The annual interest charge on the debt is now \$60,962,245 25.

FACTION AND ASSASSINATION.

Meanwhile ex-Senators Conkling and Platt were seeking a reelection at Albany. Through the strategy of the Administration leader in the Legislature, the election was postponed from May 24 one week. In the interval an expression of opinion was sought from Republican voters on the course of Messrs. Conkling and Platt, and there was almost universal condemnation of their action. Petitions against their reelection poured in upon the Legislature. The friends of the ex-Senators unsuccessfully attempted to secure their nomination by a caucus, but only 34 out of 106 Republican members attended it. The ex-Senators themselves tried in vain to stem the tide which was running against them, appearing in Albany with the Vice-President and laboring to obtain votes. Of the Republican votes cast on the first ballot, taken May 31, Mr. Conkling received 35, while 70 were cast against him; and Mr. Platt had only 29 votes, with 76 against him. For several days the voting showed little change. Mr. Depew then began to gain rapidly. Upon June 9 his vote reached 54; while that of Mr. Conkling had sunk to 33. The same day Senator Sessions was charged by Assemblyman Bradley with having given him \$2,000 as a bribe to vote for Mr. Depew. The investigation of the charge of bribery led to further indecisive votes for several weeks. On July 1 Mr. Platt withdrew from the contest. It was the day before the assassination of the President.

The insignificant creature named Guiteau had, meanwhile, bought a pistol and used it. After the adjournment of the Senate the President was still harassed by hundreds of office-seekers, and was compelled to pay attention to public business, although the centre of political interest had been shifted to Albany. Mrs. Garfield became ill and was tenderly cared for by her husband. Physicians finally advised her removal to Elberon, N. J.; whither she was taken by the President late in June. Recalled to Washington the President rapidly dispatched public business and prepared to return to Elberon. Friends had planned a journey for him and his wife to his college town. Leaving the White House in company with Secretary Blaine on the morning of July 2, the President went to the depot to take a train for Elberon. While on his way through the passenger rooms he was suddenly fired upon. The insignificant creature named Guiteau had practised on saplings to some purpose. He fired twice. One bullet entered the right side of the President's back, fracturing a rib, passing through the spinal column in front of the cord and lodging to the left of it. The President fell, exclaiming, "My God!" Meanwhile Guiteau had been imprisoned in the City Jail. When arrested he exclaimed: "I am a Stalwart and want Arthur for President." In his coat pocket a letter was found addressed "To the White House," in which he declared that the President's death was necessary "to unite the Republican party and save the Republic."

The President was told by his physicians that he had one chance in a

hundred of living. "Then we will take that chance," he said. All that mortal man could make of so slender a chance was made. His courage never faltered. He "endured the hardness" like a patient soldier. For seventy-nine days the agonizing struggle was prolonged, not fifty millions of Americans alone, but all Christendom, remaining in awful suspense, until at last the end came. It was on the evening of September 19, thirteen days after the journey from Washington to Elberon. All the watchers but Advocate-General Swain had left the sick-room. The President suddenly whispered that he was suffering great pain across the heart. Soon gathered about the dying man's bedside Mrs. Garfield and the other members of the household. A few minutes more and the President's heart ceased to beat. The agonizing struggle had ended. The following day his body was borne to Washington and there exposed in the Capitol thence it was taken to Cleveland and buried on September 26. The whole Nation, thousands of churches and hundreds of thousands of homes, joined in the solemn service, the funeral day being a National fastday. The special fund raised for Mrs. Garfield exceeded \$360,000.

THE NEW ADMINISTRATION.

Vice-President Arthur took the oath of office as President in New-York City on September 19, and subsequently repeated it before Chief Justice Waite in Washington. All the members of the Cabinet tendered their resignations, but were requested to retain their places at least temporarily. A special session of the Senate was called with a view to providing for the Presidential succession, there being neither a presiding officer of the Senate nor a Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Senate met on October 10. By refusing to allow the newly elected Senators from New-York and Rhode Island to be sworn in, the Democratic Senators took advantage of an accidental majority and elected Senator Bayard President *pro tempore*. The admission of the new Senators on October 13 led to a reversal of the majority. Through the votes of the Republican Senators and Senator Mahone, Readjuster Democrat, Senator David Davis, of Illinois, Independent, was elected President *pro tempore*, and the Republican committee list was adopted. The vote stood 36 to 34. A single Cabinet change was made during the extra session of the Senate. Secretary Windom having been elected Senator from Minnesota, ex-Governor Edwin D. Morgan, of New-York, was nominated and confirmed as Secretary of the Treasury; and when his declination was received, Charles J. Folger, Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals of New-York, accepted the portfolio. This appointment virtually involved the retirement of the best-equipped Postmaster-General the country has ever had, although his retention was particularly desirable owing to the disclosures made in the mail service. An information had been filed in the District Court against Thomas J. Brady, formerly Second Assistant Postmaster-General, and several of his clerks. On November 10 the complaints against the Star Route conspirators were dismissed by Judge Cox on the ground that proceedings of such a nature could not be begun "by information." This first failure made subsequent success even more important.

The President fully appreciated the embarrassing circumstances under which he had entered upon office. He has been exceedingly cautious in making changes in the Cabinet, avoiding as far as possible any course of action that would create public prejudice. Perhaps the greatest shock which he has given to the public consciousness was the substitution of ex-Senator Howe for the ideal Postmaster-General whom President Garfield had selected. This change was not made until December 20, and had been preceded by two appointments,—ex-Senator Frelinghuysen as Secretary of State, and Benjamin H. Brewster, who had taken a prominent part in the Star Route prosecutions, as Attorney-General. These changes were made after Congress had met on December 5, the organization of the lower House having been effected by the choice of General Keifer, of Ohio, as Speaker. President Garfield had taken four members of

his Cabinet from the main body that nominated him, and three from the powerful minority that had voted for a Third Term. In reorganizing that Cabinet, President Arthur has retired three of the majority wing and substituted for them representatives of the minority faction; and he has also replaced one member of the minority by a more compliant representative. The completion of this work has been deferred to the new year. The most satisfactory appointment the President has made is that of Chief Justice Gray, of Massachusetts, as Justice of the United States Supreme Court. His most graceful public act was his address at the Centennial celebration at Yorktown, in October, when he acknowledged the services rendered by the ancestors of the French and German guests of the Nation; and in recognition of the sympathy shown by the British sovereign and nation to the American people, ordered the flag to be saluted on shore and by the fleet. The compliment was subsequently returned in London, when the American flag was saluted on Lord Mayor's Day.

The political movements of the autumn were characterized by earnestness rather than excitement. The contest at Albany had been prolonged several weeks after the President was shot. On July 7 a caucus of 63 Republican members was held, Mr. Conkling's followers remaining out side. Mr. Depew withdrew as a candidate, and Warner Miller and Elbridge G. Lapham were nominated. It was not until July 16, however, that an election took place, Mr. Miller receiving 76 votes for Senator, or three more than were necessary to elect him. Mr. Lapham on July 22 was nominated in a caucus attended by all the Republican members, receiving 61 votes to 28 given for Mr. Conkling, and the same day was elected Senator. Mr. Conkling had appealed to a Legislature that had executed his will early in the year, but that body had shown a wholesome dread of the constituencies which elected it, and had turned against him. That public sentiment was running strongly against him was shown on October 5, when the Republicans held their State Convention in New-York. His partisans were in a minority of 108, although candidates from both wings of the party were selected. The Democrats held their State Convention at Albany on October 11, the only noteworthy incident being the exclusion of the Tammany Hall Democrats. The October elections in Ohio resulted in favor of the Republicans, and in November the same party carried New-York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Wisconsin, Kansas, Massachusetts, Nebraska and Minnesota. The coalition of Readjuster Democrats and Republicans was successful in Virginia, and subsequently H. H. Riddleberger, a Readjuster Democrat, was elected a United States Senator. This is the first break in the Solid South, and is likely to be followed by similar signs of dissolution.

FOREIGN RELATIONS—DOMESTIC PROSPERITY.

The foreign relations of the United States have been unclouded during the year by any serious misunderstanding. The Fortune Bay claims were settled by the British Government early in the year; negotiations have been reopened for securing international copyright; American statesmen availed themselves of the opportunity for an interchange of views at the Bimetallic Conference at Paris; American scientists and inventors took a prominent part in the Electrical Congress in the same city; a supplementary consular agreement with Italy has been sanctioned; and the treaties negotiated with China have been ratified on both sides. On the western coast of South America there has been an unfortunate misapprehension of the instructions of the United States Government to Ministers charged with the duty of promoting peace between Chili and Peru, but this will undoubtedly be removed when the special envoy accredited to all the Powers still at war explains his mission. The Colombian Republic having proposed to European Powers an international guarantee of the proposed Panama Canal, the United States Government has reminded those Powers of the exclusive rights

which it secured by special compact with the country to be traversed by that waterway. It has also proposed to the British Government a modification of all provisions of the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty of 1850 which are not in accord with the guarantees and privileges covenanted for in the special compact with the Colombian Republic. Mr. Blaine's dispatch to Mr. Lowell in which these modifications are proposed has been criticised in England in matters of diplomatic style, but no attempt has been made to dispute the logical strength of his positions.

The revenues of the Government during the fiscal year were \$360,782,292 57; the disbursements \$260,712,887 59; the surplus \$100,069,404 98; and \$74,480,201 05 has been used for the redemption of bonds. Compared with the previous year the receipts increased \$29,352,901 10. The exports amounted to \$902,377,346, and the imports to \$642,664,628; the excess of exports being \$259,712,718. It is estimated that the receipts of the coming year will amount to \$400,000,000, and the expenditures to \$270,000,000; leaving a surplus of \$130,000,000. In view of the enormous surplus income the President has recommended in his message that all internal taxes, except those upon tobacco, spirits and certain manufactures, be abolished. A careful revision of the tariff laws is also suggested. Out of \$102,000,000 of silver coined only \$34,000,000 is in circulation. The President has urged that the law making compulsory the coinage of at least \$2,000,000 of silver monthly be repealed. He has also proposed an increase of the Army to 30,000 men, a thorough reconstruction of the Navy, and laws against polygamy and liberal appropriations for Indian schools. Immigration has been almost unexampled during the year (approximating 500,000 in the fiscal year, and reaching 465,632 in New-York alone from January to January), although the agricultural conditions have not been as favorable as they were during the previous year. It has been a year of late snow and protracted drouth, and the production of grain has fallen 500,000,000 bushels below that of 1880. The crops have, however, been immense, and if speculators had not by artificial movements checked the natural distribution of grain, cotton and provisions, a vast surplus would have found an outlet abroad and added materially to the wealth of the Nation. Railroad capitalists have been as unreasonable as grain speculators, for they have not settled their transportation quarrels by arbitration. On the whole it has been an exceptionally busy rather than a strikingly prosperous year, and signs are not wanting, such as the two glaring betrayals of financial trust in Newark, N. J., to show that the business of the country is not so stable as it should be.

The year ends with a vulgar peep-show in a bear-garden, which under the guise of a State trial has brought reproach upon American criminal practice. Guiteau was arraigned in court on October 14 for the murder of President Garfield. On November 14 the trial began, the prisoner being defended mainly by his brother-in-law, Mr. Scoville, with assistance from Leigh Robinson, Colonel Reed, Mrs. Scoville and Dr. Spitzka, and the Government being represented by ex-Judge Porter and Mr. Davidge in addition to the District-Attorney. The cross-examination of the prisoner was so ably conducted and the evidence massed against the flimsy plea of inspirational insanity is so conclusive that it now seems certain that justice will not be cheated out of its deserts. But the trial has been from the outset a blistering disgrace to the country. The prisoner has been suffered by a judge whose backbone seems to be made of tissue paper, to act the mountebank before a grinning audience, and to empty upon relatives, counsel, witnesses and experts and the bench itself, the vials of his drivel, abuse, malevolence and smudge. The judicial system has gained as much discredit from Guiteau's crime as American surgery. It has been so nauseating a spectacle that, even with the prisoner at last in the dock, Americans must perforce begin the New Year with a bad taste in their mouths.

THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

GREAT BRITAIN.

It has been an Irish year in British politics. Parliament was summoned a month earlier than usual and remained in session eight months. Yet only one great measure was passed and practically only one subject was discussed. The collapse of the State trials in Dublin was apparent before the session opened, the acquittal of Mr. Parnell and his associates being accepted by the Government as a foregone conclusion. Without waiting for the verdict, and assuming that Ireland could not be governed by constitutional methods, they introduced, on January 24, a bill for the Protection of Persons and Property, empowering the Executive to arrest any person suspected of committing or instigating agrarian outrage. The Home Rulers, who had debated the Queen's speech at unreasonable length, now entered upon a systematic course of obstruction. A preliminary motion by Mr. Gladstone was only carried after a continuous sitting of twenty-two hours, and the bill could not be read until the Speaker intervened arbitrarily in the proceedings, and decided that the debate could not be prolonged, as the dignity and authority of the House were seriously menaced. This was on February 1, after the House had been in continuous session for forty-one hours. The Irish members, who had contrived to stop for a season the wheels of legislation, left the House in a body, and on the next day, when the Premier proposed a resolution giving the Speaker dictatorial powers whenever urgency should be declared, thirty-three Parnellites were suspended from the session. Urgency was made to depend upon a vote of three to one in a House of 300 members, and was subsequently applied in a restricted form to proceedings in committee. The resistance of the Irish members was finally overcome on February 21, when the first Coercion bill passed the Commons. A companion measure—the Arms bill—was forced through the House in nine days, becoming a law on March 21. The passage of these two force bills involved a double humiliation: It was a confession that the Liberal Government could not govern Ireland in a constitutional way, and also that parliamentary business could no longer be conducted in accordance with time-honored, although manifestly inconvenient, precedents.

THE LAND BILL.

The Conservatives declined to make certain votes of supply urgent, but business was dispatched so rapidly that both the Budget and the Irish Land bill were introduced by Mr. Gladstone before the Easter holidays. The Budget speech was conspicuous mainly for a suggestion that the burden of the permanent debt could be reduced by the substitution of long terminable annuities for part of those expiring in 1885. The Land bill was one of the most ingenious, thorough and progressive measures ever laid before the Commons. It embodied the three leading principles of fixity of tenure, revaluation of rents and free sale of tenant right. Under it the tenant, whenever his landlord increased the rent, acquired the privilege of applying to the Land Commission to fix a fair rent for the statutory term of fifteen years, or of selling his interest in his holding, with the alternative of receiving an increased award for compensation if he should be ejected. The appeal to the commission could be made even if there were no increase in rent, and the tenant would be entitled to the privilege of occupation for fifteen years if a settlement were made without the intervention of the court. He could not have an arbitrary increase of rent put on him; the rent could not be based on any improvements which he or his predecessors had made without receiving compensation for them; he could not be disturbed for fifteen years provided he

paid his rent; and he could sell his improvements and the general privilege of occupancy to the highest bidder. There were also supplementary provisions relating to fixed tenancies, peasant proprietorship and emigration. The debate on the second reading, begun April 25, was closed on May 19 with a Government majority of 352 to 176, the Ulster Conservatives and the moderate Home Rulers acting with the Ministerialists, and a small number of Parnellites refraining from voting. The bill remained in committee from that time until July 22, Mr. Gladstone conducting the debates with unexampled patience and resolute purpose. Few changes were made in the bill, and the Government was sustained by majorities exceeding 100, except in two instances, Lord Edmund Fitzmaurice's limitation of the fair rent clause, where it fell to 36, and on Mr. Heneage's amendment excluding leases from the action of the act where it was almost as low. The opposition did not oppose the third reading, and the bill was finally passed by a vote of 220 to 14.

The Conservative leadership in the Upper House had devolved upon Lord Salisbury after the death of Lord Beaconsfield, which occurred on April 18. When the Land bill was introduced in the House of Lords, he condemned it in principle and detail, but announced that he should not oppose its second reading, but merely amend in committee some of the most unjust provisions. The amendments proposed by himself and the Whig deserters from the Ministry, Lord Lansdowne and the Duke of Argyll, were with trifling exceptions rejected by the House of Commons and then reaffirmed by the House of Lords. A crisis seemed imminent after Lord Salisbury had declared that the country could judge between the Ministry and the majority of the Peers; but a compromise was arranged by representatives of the leading parties, whereby the Commons yielded two and the Lords ten of the important points in dispute. Mr. Gladstone's concessions were, first, the Parnell amendment granting a stay of proceedings for sale under writs of execution for debt or damages pending a final decision of the court in regard to what would be a fair rent; and, secondly, a compromise whereby the landlord was, under certain circumstances, authorized to ask the court to force a sale of the tenant right. Lord Salisbury's concessions related to the vital principles of the bill. In this form the Land bill became a law.

PARTY MOVEMENTS.

Parliament was prorogued on August 27 after a protracted session, of which the Land bill was almost the sole outcome. The Government was supported throughout by compact majorities, the Premier succeeding in massing the sentiment of Whigs and Radicals alike. A resolution censuring the Government for the abandonment of Candahar, which had been carried in the Upper House by a vote of 165 to 76, was rejected in the Commons by a vote of 336 to 216; and the final arrangement with the Boers received a similar vote of approval—314 to 205. In only one episode of the session did Mr. Gladstone give tokens of the slightest indecision. Mr. Bradlaugh, having been declared by the courts to be incapable of making affirmation in place of an oath, secured a reelection from Northampton and applied to take the usual parliamentary oath. Sir Stafford Northcote, in opposition to the Premier, effected his removal from the House. Mr. Gladstone after some delay gave notice of an Oaths bill, but after three days' debate the subject was dropped. Mr. Bradlaugh made two subsequent efforts to enter the House, being dragged outside by the police on the second occasion. The only change in the Cabinet during the year was the substitution of Lord Carlingford for the Duke of Argyll as Lord of the Privy Seal. Mr. Courtney, a prominent Radical, became Under-Secretary for the Colonies, and Lord Rosebery, as Under-Secretary for the Home Department, the leader of the Scotch Liberals. The Conservatives in the Lower House evinced very little resolution during the session, but the general results of the bye-elections and the municipal contests have been favorable to them. At least two seats in the Commons were gained through direct appeals to Protectionist sentiment, a cross-current

in that direction having set in during the summer, and several closely contested boroughs were carried with the aid of the Irish vote. The Conservatives have gained ten seats, counting for twenty on a division, since the general elections in 1880. These gains, however, are not conclusive evidence that the Liberals have forfeited the confidence of the constituencies. The population of Great Britain has been ascertained by census to exceed 35,500,000.

WAR WITH THE LEAGUE.

In the North of Ireland the Government have held their ground in two important elections—Tyrone and Londonderry. Outside of Ulster the Land act has not conciliated the political support of the Irish constituencies. Mr. Parnell and his associates undertook to prejudice the tenant-farmers against it before the Land Court was opened. They urged their followers to keep out of the court until the League could submit certain test cases and ascertain what reductions would be made in rent. Although a large majority of the Irish members had voted for the Land act as a substantial measure of justice, and genuine Nationalists like Sir Charles Gavan Duffy had borne testimony to the merits of Mr. Gladstone's scheme of reform, Mr. Parnell succeeded in giving a new direction to Irish disaffection by addressing large concourses and warning the tenants against what he described as the illusory promises of a faithless Government. The Premier was compelled to choose between abandoning the Land act altogether and arresting the Irish leader who was paralyzing the action of the Government and bringing to naught the single measure on which the energies of the session had been concentrated. After giving warning of his determination at Leeds, he faced this melancholy alternative on October 13, when Mr. Parnell was arrested in Dublin. Mr. Dillon and other leaders were subsequently imprisoned, and the island was thrown into intense excitement, with outbreaks of riotous demonstration in a few quarters, and one cargo of dynamite machines from America. The imprisoned leaders united in a manifesto to the Irish tenants, urging them not to pay rent while their representatives were deprived of liberty. The Government dealt a staggering blow in return by proclaiming the Land League an illegal and criminal association. The public work of that body ceased from that time. The main office was closed and the branches were converted into secret organizations. At the same time the Land Court was opened. It was a distinctively Irish tribunal, with two zealous friends of the tenant class and only one landlord, an eminently just man, on the bench. It began by simplifying its rules of procedure, and reducing the expenses of tenants' appeals, and the first decisions rendered by the subcommissioners disclosed a most liberal construction of the act, the reductions in rent averaging from 30 to 40 per cent. The prelates, headed by Archbishop Croke, who had sanctioned the cause of the Land League until he was appalled by the rank dishonesty of the anti-rent manifesto, brought their influence to bear most powerfully against the desperate tactics of the imprisoned agitators, and the decisions of the subcommissioners tended to reassure the tenant farmers. Yet Ireland has not been pacified. The secret League has greater influence in many counties than the open court. The pressure of business before the sub-commissioners is so great that the tenants cannot expect a speedy disposition of their cases, and the temptation to withhold rents in the hope of making better terms after another season of agitation is too strong to be resisted. There has been a marked increase of all forms of agrarian crime. Juries are not to be trusted. Concessions are repulsed. Discontent has become more sullen. The general situation is disheartening.

SOUTH AFRICA.

In South Africa the British Government have had the moral courage to bring an iniquitous war to an end without waiting to retrieve disasters in the field inflicted by an inferior adversary. General Colley, finding

that the garrisons in the Transvaal were surrendering in rapid succession, advanced with 1,200 or 1,500 men, without waiting for the reinforcements which had arrived on the coast. His plan was to relieve the garrisons and restore the authority of the Crown before the Boers, emboldened by their successes, could receive irregular reinforcements from the Orange Free State. In a fortnight he had been seriously defeated, and was fighting to keep his communications open. Sir Evelyn Wood, with a column of reinforcements, reached Newcastle on February 16, and opened communications with General Colley on Prospect Hill. While the British columns were waiting for reinforcements the Boers asked through President Brand for terms of peace and the British Government telegraphed certain conditions. General Colley realized that the war would cease if these conditions should be accepted, and he was anxious to retrieve his military reputation, which had suffered from his defeats at Laing's Neck and Ingayana. Taking advantage of Sir Evelyn Wood's absence he made a night march and seized Majuba Hill, a position commanding the enemy's camp at Laing's Neck. His force consisted of 679 men, of whom 300 were detailed to protect communications; and he had been unable to carry artillery up the mountain. The Boers attacked the force on February 27, and on the fourth assault drove the British down the hill, killing, wounding or capturing 266 men. General Colley paid full penalty for his ambition and recklessness, being among the slain. The defeat was as unnecessary as it was humiliating, for reinforcements were moving rapidly and peace was nearly concluded.

The Home Government appointed General Roberts to the supreme command, and sent out additional reinforcements. The war was brought to a close on March 21, when the Boer leaders agreed to the British terms, abandoning Laing's Neck, acknowledging the Queen as suzerain, and admitting a resident at the capital to protect the natives. This convention accorded to the Boers every right for which they had taken up arms except the privilege of reenslaving the natives. It was ratified by the Volksraad on October 25. The Natal colonists and the Transvaal refugees expressed their dissatisfaction by burning Mr. Gladstone in effigy, but the Cape Parliament approved the cessation of war and passed a congratulatory address to the Queen.

BRITISH ASIA.

The financial condition of British India has slightly improved and there are no signs of disaffection in the immense population acknowledging the sovereignty of Lord Beaconsfield's Empress. The Government is now proposing to reimpose the income tax in order to do away with the cotton tax. The population of British India has increased 13,000,000 since 1871, and is now 218,000,000. This increase exceeds the rate in Canada, where the census aggregates 4,350,933.

The British Government has granted to the British North Borneo Company a Royal Charter, which formally recognizes the rights and privileges a great China merchant and his associates have acquired by purchase from the petty sovereigns of an island twice as large as France. Within its domain the Company is vested with authority never possessed even by the East India Company, and by buying out the Rajah of Sarawak it may gain possession of the northern half of one of the most valuable islands in the world. The Government in sanctioning the tremendous powers assumed by the Company seems to have taken a long step toward the annexation of the island and to have neglected many precautions. Such precipitous action was not expected from a Liberal Ministry. This land grab has excited some resentment in Holland and Spain, whose claims upon North Borneo are based upon ancient treaties with native princes.

When the year opened a British garrison still lingered at Candahar.

The military operations upon which an imaginative Premier and an impulsive Viceroy had entered with such light hearts had cost over \$100,000,000, and all that there was to show for this enormous waste of treasure was this old trading town of 60,000 people. The report that the Government had determined to evacuate Candahar brought Lord Beaconsfield to his feet on the opening night of the session with the sneer on his lips that the British were "scuttling" out of Afghanistan, and Lord Lytton secured the publication of the Russian papers seized at Cabul. The danger and expense of occupying a post so far removed from the Indian frontier were so obvious that the Government was sustained by the Commons in the policy of evacuation. On April 21 the British flag was hauled down and the garrison withdrawn.

Candahar was occupied at once by an Afghan chief in the service of the Ameer. Ayoob Khan subsequently defeated the Ameer's army in the vicinity of Candahar, but neglected to take advantage of his good fortune. On September 22, the Ameer massed his troops between Candahar and Herat, and, forcing Ayoob to give battle, defeated his army of 15,000 men. Abdurrahman in this way gained possession of Candahar, and, as one of his generals subsequently entered Herat after another battle, has established his authority throughout Afghanistan. As soon as the British left the country to take care of itself the strongest prince vanquished his rivals and pacified the tribes.

RUSSIA.

Autocracy has shared the fate of Republicanism. Alexander II. was assassinated in his own capital on March 13. His Home Minister, Melikoff, had been boasting that the whole series of assassination plots had been planned by a comparatively small number of conspirators, every one of whom had been hunted down and hounded out of life. Suddenly a derisive shout was heard. The Czar was assassinated in broad daylight as he was driving to his palace, two bombs being thrown under his carriage. One of the conspirators was immediately seized and five more were subsequently arrested. Five of these Nihilists perished on the scaffold on April 15, after a military trial: Jeliaboff, the leader, who had been captured two days before the assassination; Sophie Pieoffski, a nobleman's granddaughter, who gave the signal to the bomb-throwers; Kibaltschitsch, who made the glass bombs; Russokoff, who threw one of them, and Michailoff, who was arrested in Russokoff's house. The sixth conspirator, Hessa Helfmann, who kept the lodging-house where the bombs were stored, was sentenced to death, but subsequently imprisoned for life. One prominent conspirator is believed to have escaped.

Alexander III., on ascending the throne, ordered a great ceremonial interment of his father. He was urged by Melikoff and the Council of Ministers to summon a constituent Assembly to be elected by the people and endowed with consultative powers. After a period of hesitation and wavering, he decided to adhere to the old methods of repression. He refused to grant the consultative parliament, but sanctioned two decrees for the relief of peasants who were suffering from burdens imposed by the law of emancipation. By one of these ukases landlords, who had not settled with their enfranchised serfs, were directed to do so, and to furnish them with land before January 1, 1883; and by the other the interest on the purchase funds guaranteed to the landowners was reduced. These measures affected as many as 19,000,000 peasants—a class who have not been demoralized by Nihilist teachings. Melikoff resigned when the Czar decided against introducing the parliament, and the personnel of the ad-

ministration was changed, Ignatieff becoming Home Minister and Giers Minister of Foreign Affairs. The Revolutionary Committee expressed its disapproval in open threats, and the sovereign has remained the greater part of the year buried in his palace at Gatchina. The only overt attack made by the Nihilists was an unsuccessful attempt upon the life of one of the officials of the Interior Department.

The most conspicuous diplomatic event of the year was the interview between Alexander III. and the aged sovereign of Germany, which took place March 9 at Dantzic. The meeting was marked by cordiality on both sides, and resulted in the complete restoration of friendly relations between the two Courts. It has not yet been supplemented by an interview between the Czar and the Emperor of Austria-Hungary, but the alliance between the military Empires familiarly known as the Three Emperors' League has virtually been renewed. Since the Dantzic interview the influence of noted Panslavists like Katkoff and Alsakoff has sensibly diminished at St. Petersburg, for the alliance implies common interests and pacific intentions in southeastern Europe. In Central Asia Skobelev is no longer marching eastward, but Askabad, lying 350 miles from the main base of supplies on the Caspian, has been fortified and the Trans-Caspian country completely pacified. The chiefs at Merv have opened negotiations with the Russian commander at Askabad, but no progress has been made in that direction. There have also been some mysterious consultations in Constantinople with reference to the Armenian frontier and the war indemnity.

AUSTRIA-HUNGARY.

The conflict of race tendencies has been somewhat less marked in the Dual-Empire. In Hungary the political supremacy of the Magyars is easily maintained. The Diet was dissolved during the summer at the close of its allotted term after it had disposed of a large amount of practical legislation, judicial, administrative and economic, effecting a conversion of the public debt, carrying out various schemes of railway extension and enacting a criminal code and a bankruptcy law. The general elections for a new Diet resulted in a return of a compact Liberal majority pledged to support the Tisza Ministry, the Extreme Left gaining several seats from the Conservatives. In Austria the Taaffe Ministry has made ineffectual efforts to cancel its obligations to its three groups of supporters, the Clericals, the Czechs and the Poles. The special concessions which it offered were changes in the school laws, the division of the University of Prague into Czech and German departments, and various railway projects for Galicia. These bills were all blocked in the upper house where the Constitutionalists had a small majority. The Reichsrath was abruptly adjourned in the summer, and when it reassembled in the autumn the Constitutionalists found themselves in a minority in the upper house, the sovereign having nominated as life members a dozen supporters of the coalition Ministry. While the tendencies of the present Ministry are decentralizing, no decided advances have yet been made in the direction of local autonomy, although the way has now been opened by the conversion of new peers for more reactionary legislation. The Constitutionalists, viewing with alarm the direction which affairs have taken, have succeeded in effecting a complete reorganization of the groups in opposition.

By the death of Baron Haymerle a conspicuous figure has been removed from the circle of European diplomats. As Minister of Foreign Affairs for the whole Empire his main work had been the promotion of the German-Austrian alliance, and his policy had been regarded with equal favor in Pesth and Vienna. His successor, Count Kalnoky, has devoted himself

exclusively to the diplomatic service for many years, and has not formed any entangling alliances in domestic politics. Although descended from an old Magyar family, he shares the prejudices of the feudal aristocracy in Moravia and will find it easy to make terms with the reactionary Cabinet in the hereditary States. At the same time, from his close associations with Russian diplomatists at St. Petersburg he has been obviously chosen by the Emperor as the Minister who will be signally successful in adapting the German-Austrian alliance to the new conditions of the Danzic interview. The financial position of the Dual-Empire has improved during the year. In Bosnia and Herzegovina the introduction of the Austrian-Hungarian military system has met with resistance in some quarters, but not with serious opposition. The marriage of the Crown Prince to the Princess Stephanie of Belgium, which was solemnized in Vienna, connects the Hapsburgs more closely with the Coburgs of Europe, a family of stalwart Constitutionalists, whose advice and influence will be wholesome. This gala-week of festivity is in strong contrast with the mourning which followed the terrible loss of life caused by the burning of the Ring Theatre in Vienna.

GERMANY.

Bismarck has been kicking against the pricks from the beginning to the end of the year. When the Reichstag was opened in February he unfolded a series of socialist proposals for lessening the burdens of the lower classes. He had already forced through the Prussian Landtag large reductions of direct taxes which were peculiarly oppressive to the poor, and now he has brought forward a bill for insuring workmen against accident. The Liberals allowed it to pass after they had completely changed its character, substituting an insurance society in every State for a central organization, and by refusing aid from the Imperial Exchequer putting the whole charge upon masters and men. A singularly unproductive session was brought to a close in June and preparations were made by the Government and all the groups in the Reichstag for an active electoral canvass, the term of the Reichstag having expired. These elections were held in September. The general result was as follows: Centre, 110; Conservatives, 77; Progressists, 60; National Liberals, 45; Secessionists, 48; Popular party, 7; Social Democrats, 13; Poles, 18; Alsace-Lorrainers, 15; and Savages or Eccentrics, 4. This was a Bismarckian defeat. The Conservatives whom the Chancellor openly supported met with heavy losses; the Centralists, whom he finds it so difficult to manage, slightly improved their position; the Socialists, whom he has sought to crush by means of force bills, returned six more members than they had in the last Reichstag; the Liberals against whom his electoral campaign was directed made sweeping gains and elected more uncompromising men.

When the Reichstag met in October the Emperor's speech created keen disappointment. It did not contain the slightest reference to the change in political conditions of the Empire, but brought forward the old reactionary proposals precisely as if Bismarck's policy had been generally approved. The Chancellor replied on November 29 to the assaults of the Progressists in one of the bitterest diatribes of his career, denouncing the attitude of the Liberals and affirming that Germany could not be governed after the English pattern, as the conduct of affairs was in the Emperor's hands and the Chancellor was his responsible adviser. The Ultramontane leader supported the Government on the ground that the country had reason to be satisfied with the positive results of recent years. The Chancellor has never had so difficult a Parliament to manage as the present

one, for it contains bold spirits who do not hesitate to declare that the Hohenzollerns have no liking for the domination of major-domos, and that the Crown Prince in his day will maintain complete independence in his dealings with his Ministers; and, furthermore, he can only meet the Liberal strength by massing the Conservative and Ultramontane parties, and enlisting the services of the Poles and Alsace-Lorrainers. Political necessity has forced him to advance another stage on the route to Canossa. By the appointment of Dr. Korum to the See of Treves, and by the proposed dispatch of a Minister to the Vatican, he has virtually confessed that the May laws are to be abandoned, and the opposition to Rome brought to an end. The Emperor's health is gradually failing, and the Chancellor cannot with certainty count upon the unwavering support of the heir to the throne. Meanwhile, impoverishment of the Fatherland, dislike for military service and restlessness under political restraint are swelling the tide of emigration to America. Within five months, ending December 1, over 100,000 Germans landed in the United States. The Fatherland has a commanding position in Europe; in the Three-Emperors' League the Kaiser is virtually an arbiter between two rivals for domination in the Baikan Peninsula, but within, everything is unstable.

FRANCE.

French republicanism has not met with any reverses. The municipal elections held early in the year confirmed the general result of the preliminary struggle of the previous August over the partial renewal of the Council-General. The decrees against the religious orders had been enforced with unseemly zeal and unnecessary brutality. Yet on the first opportunity which the people had of expressing their personal convictions they sustained the party in power. The work of legislation dragged during the spring session of the Chambers, and what was done in reference to the press laws, the schools and the municipalities, was not thoroughly done. The Ferry Ministry was recognized as a makeshift which must soon fall to pieces. Gambetta had adopted the Scrutin de Liste, or department system of elections, as his personal measure, and had succeeded in silencing the objections of the President, and in forcing the Cabinet to remain neutral, so that the question could be decided without apprehensions of a ministerial crisis. Reappearing in the tribune on May 19, and supporting the measure in an elaborate speech, he enforced his will, but only by a narrow majority. An ill-timed journey to the Bonapartist department of the Lot conducted with the pomp of an imperial progress, gave a new edge to senatorial jealousy, and Gambetta's measure was rejected by a decisive majority. He met with another rebuff in the lower house when he attempted to precipitate an appeal to the country. The general elections were finally ordered with unnecessary abruptness and Gambetta narrowly escaped defeat at Belleville. This was a sign that his republicanism was no longer accepted as real and progressive by the Mount Aventine of the Republic. The general result of the election was an overwhelming Republican triumph. The strength of the reactionary factions was reduced to 88, the Republican majority including 459 members, divided as follows: Left Centre, 39; Pure Left, 168; Advanced Left, 206; Extreme Left, 46. As 68 members of the Advanced Left subsequently formed a new group called the Radical Left, the number of supporters upon whom the present Ministry can depend is 342 in a Chamber of 547.

The Ferry Ministry was forced to face the new Chambers, although its days had long been numbered. Gambetta was at once singled out for office by a complimentary vote for temporary presiding officer, and when he was

formally intrusted with the formation of a Ministry, Brisson, leader of the Advanced Left, was elected his successor in the lower house. Gambetta's Ministry was gazetted on November 15. It created surprise, because it was made up mainly of untried men. Two members of the former Ministry were retained, Cazot and Cochery, but the rest were taken almost bodily from the staff of the Premier's own newspaper. The most conspicuous member was Paul Bert, Minister of Worship and Public Instruction, a freethinker of spotless integrity and scientific ardor, whose views of the Concordat and religious establishments were radical enough to satisfy even the Extreme Left. The Ministry was recruited almost entirely from the Advanced Left, the Left Centre having only one representative, and while its members still have their reputations to make, they are all devoted followers of the Premier, and will support him as effectively as a general staff aids the commander at headquarters. Gambetta's policy, so far as he has defined it, contains no startling features, but marks a decided advance upon the programmes that have preceded it. One of its elements is a strict enforcement of the Concordat; another the abolition of life senatorships and other changes in the senatorial electoral system, and still another is a reform of the Judiciary. The autumn elections indicate that the approaching senatorial elections will result in the choice of advanced Republicans and some of the leading spirits of the Left Centre have already accepted many of Gambetta's proposals. The Premier secured his first votes in supply very easily, but on one occasion encountered a minority vote of 120 headed by his rival, Dr. Clemenceau. His influence seems unimpaired, notwithstanding his misfortunes at Belleville. This is because he is stronger in France than in Paris, and more popular out of the Chamber than in it.

The French Government has resorted to some of the worst devices of Imperial diplomacy in order to increase its foreign prestige. The campaign in Tunisia was undertaken on a false pretext trumped up by St. Hilaire, for the purpose of making dupes of the other Powers. The Kroumirs, whose raids across the Algerian border were seized upon as a convenient excuse for the expedition, were ready to surrender to the Bey, when the invading columns were set in motion on April 26. In violation of positive pledges to the Bey and to the European Powers the principality was rapidly overrun, the capital approached, a treaty of peace dictated and the country virtually annexed. It was a dashing exploit, albeit decidedly immoral, but Nemesis overtook the troops before they could reembark for Marseilles. A fanaticism had been enkindled among the tribes of Northern Africa. First came a revolt in Constantine; next an insurrection in Oran; then fire and slaughter in the Spanish settlements; and finally war to the knife in Southern Tunisia. Sfax was battered down, the troops were increased to 32,000 in Algeria and 39,000 in Tunisia, and, after laborious preparation, an advance was made upon the holy city, Kairwan, the shrine of Mohammed's chosen friend. Eight months have passed since the expedition was planned as a holiday march, and the columns are still massed in the principality with serious campaigning still before them. These Mediterranean operations have, moreover, wounded the susceptibilities of a serviceable ally—Italy.

ITALY.

The invasion of Tunis by the French troops and the treaty which the Bey signed when a pistol was virtually leveled against his head, caused intense irritation in Italy. The two nations had been competing with each other for political ascendancy and commercial advantages in the Principality. When the Cairoli Ministry was shown to have been overreached by St. Hilaire, it had no standing in the Chamber. The King intrusted Sella, the leader of the Right, with the organization of a new Ministry,

but after consulting with the principals of the various groups he could not unite them on the question of electoral reform. Depretis finally succeeded in organizing a Cabinet Ministry recruited mainly from the Left Centre. It was the old Cabinet with Cairoli left out. This Ministry has proposed a scheme of educational suffrage which has received favorable votes in both Chambers.

From the tone of Mancini, the Foreign Minister, in recent debates, it is plain that the new rivalry with France has effaced the old enmity to Austria. The visit of King Humbert to Vienna, planned after the Dantzic interview had shown what was the tendency of imperial politics, has been variously interpreted. It has been assumed that the journey was made to offer the consent of Italy to any scheme of Austrian progress in the Balkan Peninsula in return for the Trentino. It seems more probable that there were no references to an agitation that had spent its force, but that the diplomatic motive of the excursion was a desire to place Italy in line with the great military States and to leave France isolated. The nation, smarting under the humiliating sense that its Mediterranean rival has duped and outstripped it, already anticipates some foreign war in which its resentment can be brought to bear—not against its enemy of 1859—but against its ally.

EGYPT AND THE BALKAN.

The Egyptian Army after giving evidence of a mutinous disposition on three occasions finally revolted on September 12. Irritated by certain military appointments and orders, it assembled before the Khedive's Palace and demanding the dismissal of the Ministry and clamoring against foreign intervention, named Cherif, who was in office when Ismail abdicated, as a suitable President of the Council. The sovereign conceded most of the demands of the mob, appointed Cherif Premier, and late in the autumn convoked an Assembly of Notables. The compromise has quieted matters temporarily, but the mutinous army has not been disbanded. The incident has illustrated the inherent weakness of the dual protectorate of Great Britain and France, each jealous of the other's influence in Egypt, and the shadowy nature of the Sultan's sovereignty. What the native population evidently wishes to do is to get rid of foreign financial control, whereby half the revenue of the country is reserved for the payment of interest of a debt the bulk of which was never directly borrowed.

Roumania was proclaimed a kingdom on March 26 by a vote of Parliament. Some expressions in the King's address to the Deputies created a misunderstanding with the Austrian-Hungarian Foreign Office, which led to a temporary suspension of diplomatic civilities. The estrangement has ceased after full explanations have been offered.

The Prince of Bulgaria, two years after he had sworn to support the Constitution, dismissed the advisers who were in accord with the majority of the Deputies, organized a Ministry of combat, and appealing to the country threatened to resign if he were not allowed to remodel the Constitution. After an electoral campaign, in which military force was openly employed, he succeeded in imposing upon the nervous agitation of the constituencies and in wrenching from them an informal plebiscite. The new National Assembly received his supplementary Constitution with becoming meekness, remained in session an hour, suggested the prosecution of the Liberal leaders, and left him free to govern the Principality for seven years as he liked. It was a peculiarly Russian incident.

The European Powers, after protracted negotiations, receded from the decision of the supplementary Berlin Conference and accepted the Porte's proposal that Greece should have the greater part of Thessaly but only a

small fragment of Epirus. The maritime kingdom was reluctantly compelled to accede to these terms, gaining thereby a fertile plain of considerable extent, but losing Janina and Prevesa and a natural frontier. This territory has been ceded to Greece by the Turkish officials after the usual course of prevarication, treachery and delay.

There has been the usual diplomatic chatter at Constantinople throughout the year. Russian and German diplomats have been intriguing there, and English and French financial agents have been chaffering over a possible reduction of the aggregate Turkish debt to \$700,000,000 funded at 4 per cent. The Greek frontier negotiations, the Egyptian emente, and the Tripoli complications have been the leading diplomatic incidents. In Albania there has been an insurrection, which was easily suppressed. The trial of Midhat, Mahmoud, Damad, Nouri and several attendants for the murder of Abdul Aziz resulted, during the summer, in a conviction on insufficient evidence. The Court sentenced all the prisoners to death, but the lives of the Pachas were subsequently spared, and the sentences remitted to exile for life. Reforms there have been none, in Armenia or in any other quarter of the Ottoman Empire.

SPAIN.

The Spanish elections on August 21 resulted as they invariably do, in the return of a large majority of Ministerial supporters. Sagasta's main difficulty will be to reconcile the groups of a majority that is inconveniently large. There is promise of liberal legislation, of which Spain is in sore need but educational reform and religious freedom still have to face a formidable opposition from the Church. Sagasta's majority seems to favor an extension of the suffrage, enlightened press laws, and educational emancipation. The Liberal coalition includes fifty Deputies who are partisans of Marshal Campos, and seceded with him from the Conservative ranks.

SOUTH AMERICA.

The war between Chili and Peru virtually ended with the capture of Lima on January 17. Pierola the President of Peru, escaped from the battlefield, and subsequently rallied a few followers in the North. After several months of military occupation, Calderon assumed the provisional presidency, and on July 10 convoked a congress in the vicinity of Lima. This body, under the protection of a Chilian garrison, elected him President for a year. Pierola's faction was hostile to the movement, and the Government would have ceased to exist if the Chilian troops had marched out. Admiral Lynch finally deposed President Calderon under the pretext that the provisional Government was ruining trade by unlimited issues of paper money, some of which were fraudulent. Subsequently Calderon and his Foreign Minister were arrested and sent to Santiago. Pierola's forces are dwindling, and the Chilians, having proclaimed martial law for an indefinite period, are evidently bent upon territorial acquisition. The United States Minister's course has compromised his Government without facilitating arbitration.

The boundary dispute between the Argentine Republic and Chili has been settled. The Brazilian elections in the autumn resulted in Liberal gains. The American Steamship Line has been discontinued during the year.

CHINA AND JAPAN.

The War Party has gained an ascendancy in Peking. Tso Tsung Tang, who suppressed the Mussulman Government in Kashgar, has been recalled to the Capital and installed in the highest office at the head of the Ministry of War. The annexation of Anam is reported to have been planned by the French in Cochin-China. The Chinese have established a line of steamers, built, owned and manned by natives, between Shanghai and London.

The Mikado of Japan has promised his subjects a constitution and a representative assembly. The reforms are to be introduced in 1890.

GENERAL SURVEY.

The great religious event of the year has been the publication of the Revised Version of the New Testament. The text was presented in May to the Convocation of the Province of Canterbury after undergoing six or seven distinct revisions in the course of ten years and six months by the British and American companies. In the Gospels between eight and nine changes had been made for every five verses, and in the Epistles about fifteen changes in every five verses. The work was immediately published in the United States as well as Great Britain, and had an enormous sale. It has not been formally adopted by any religious body in either country as a substitute for the King James version.

The Pope has reiterated at various times his complaint that he is virtually imprisoned in Rome, and that the Italian Government affords him no security against the assaults of street mobs. The scandalous scenes in September, when the body of Pius IX. was removed, and the cheers with which the rioters were greeted outside the court-room have confirmed his apprehensions. To pilgrims and foreign ambassadors the assertion is constantly made that the Pope must choose between captivity and imprisonment. The Italian Government seems reluctant to repress the anti-Papal demonstrations. At the recent canonization of four saints, Labre, De Rossi, Laurent and Claire, the Pope's extreme feebleness was apparent. Count Campo, one of the canons of St. Peter's, has abjured the Catholic religion and joined the Methodist Church. The main religious council of the year was the Ecumenical Methodist Conference held in City Road Chapel, London.

The year has been marked by disasters of extraordinary magnitude. The island of Chios or Scio was devastated by an earthquake on April 3; 15,000 persons were killed or injured, and 40,000 more were left homeless. By the forest fires in Northern Michigan many lives were lost and great suffering was caused. By the destruction of the Ring Theatre in Vienna nearly 800 persons were burned to death, and the loss of life at the Opera House at Nice was also very large. The collapse of the excursion steamer Victoria on the Thames, near London, Canada, the mysterious boiler explosion on the British man-of-war Doterel, and the loss of 198 steamers and 1,459 lives are the marine disasters of the year.

An active interest has been manifested in Arctic exploration. Three vessels were sent by the Navy Department to search for Mr. Bennett's exploring expedition. The Corwin succeeded in reaching Wrangell Land early in the season, and the Rodgers subsequently made a survey of the coast, proving that it was an island of limited extent, and penetrated to latitude 74 degrees without finding any traces of land. The Alliance, coasting between Greenland and Iceland in the expectation that the Jeannette might have been abandoned near the Pole and the crew have attempted to retreat upon the highest inhabitable land, reached latitude 80°

10'. The Jeannette, of which no traces were reported, had been crushed by the ice on June 11, in longitude 157° east, latitude 77° 15'. The retreat was made in boats and sledges to the mouth of the Lena River in Siberia, the distance exceeding 550 miles, and the voyage occupying more than ninety days. Eight members of the ship's company are still reported missing, but hopes are entertained that there has been no loss of life. Polar colonies have been landed at Cape Barrow and Discovery Bay, the latter under favorable conditions for future explorations. A Scotch whaler succeeded during the summer in traversing the principal channels where Sir John Franklin spent his last years, and Leigh Smith, an English yachtsman, is now supposed to be wintering in Franz Josef Land.
